The final schedule will be prepared and sent to all parishes with the September 2015 SDNB.

OFFICE OF THE CHANCELLOR

The Department of Labor (DOL) announced recently that they are putting forth new regulations to the white collar exemption under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA). This will impact which employees may be paid a constant wage each week regardless of the hours they work and which employees must be paid an hourly wage and are subject to overtime pay for any hours worked over forty (40) in a week. The proposed changes will be published for a 60 day period so that businesses and organizations can offer comment.

After the 60 day comment period the Department of Labor is free to announce their final draft. These new changes will most likely go into effect the spring or summer of 2016. I will contact you once I know for certain what the final draft states. The amendments, if passed, will significantly increase the minimum salary test from \$23,660 to \$50,440. This will, undoubtedly, cause us to reclassify some of our employees to hourly employees. I wish this was not the case but once it becomes the law we will need to comply. I will work with you to make any necessary changes if the DOL proposal becomes law.

- 1) Please use the new Narrative outline. A Word template is available from <u>carolyn.juenemann@salinadiocese.org</u> or 785-827-8746, Ext. 22.
- 2) Baptism certificate needs to be dated within recent six (6) months and include notations;
- 3) Marriage certificate and divorce decree;
- 4) Include \$50.00 Initial fee
- 5) Review the Preliminary Petition before mailing it to office for completion:
 - Petitioner has signed both the Preliminary Petition and the Narrative;
 - Current address of Respondent (or list of attempts to find him/her);
 - Current Addresses for parents, siblings and/or other witnesses;
 - List all previous and/or later marriages for both Petitioner and Respondent, including the dates of those marriages
 - E-mail and phone number of petitioner

A parish mission/retreat

In the spirt of the New Evangelization, a parish mission (or retreat) is an opportunity for a spiritual awakening and renewal for the parish. It is not intended to be primarily catechetical or educational, though certainly instruction and learning information about the faith may be a component. The primary focus of the mission/retreat is to offer an encounter with the person of Christ which can bring a new hope to the participants, and through the participants, to the world. (Note: a parish mission/retreat is not to be confused with a financial and educational "mission appeal" made by Catholic missionaries who work with the poor throughout the world. These appeals are generally during the summer months and only involve the parish weekend Masses.)

Identifying a presenter

You may wish to consider a presenter from the accompanying "Parish Mission/Retreat Presenter" listing. These are not the only parish mission/retreat speakers available, but they are some that have been referred by parishes in our diocese or our neighboring diocese of Dodge City. The contact information presented to you is the most complete that is available.

Some of the presenters have websites. Even if they do not, a "google search" online might result in helpful information. It is highly encouraged that you ask the presenter for some references (other parishes where they have spoken) and follow up with contacts for their evaluation/experience of the presenter. The Office of New Evangelization (785 827 8746 x 20; propfaith@salinadiocese.org) has a limited amount of additional information about the speakers.

Presentation

Each speaker has their own preferred format, content, and theme. You need to inquire of them about particulars. You may discuss with the presenter your local requests and adaptations, but it is unusual that the presenter would deviate much from their original plan.

Possible services to be offered by the presenter:

- How many nights/days will be scheduled for the mission? Two, three, four? Could there be daytime presentations scheduled for those unable to attend evening presentations?
- Will the presenter come to the parish and make a "pitch" for the mission at the weekend Masses preceding the beginning of the mission?
- Does it work best to begin the mission presentations on a Sunday night or Monday night or at some other time?
- Will the presenter be asked to present to any special groups such as the parish youth, youth ministers, director of religious education, or RCIA team? Will the presenter be available for individual daytime appointments?
- If a priest, would he preside and preach at weekday Masses during the time of the mission?
- Will the mission include a communal penance service or other individual Confession times during the mission?
- Do you wish the presenter to visit any of the homebound or hospitalized of the parish?

Costs

- It is standard that the parish will be responsible for travel costs of the presenter. Some may drive their own vehicle (\$.57.5/mile, the IRS allowance for vehicle expense in 2015), others may fly and ask to be transported to the parish from the airport, others may fly and insist on renting a car (also at parish expense.)
- The parish is responsible to provide room and board during the mission (and preceding weekend, if applicable.) Some presenters agree to stay in the parish rectory or a parishioner home. Others are very particular about commercial lodging, insisting, for example, on their preferred accommodations, to be provided at parish expense. If the desired commercial accommodations are not available locally in a small, rural community, some presenters will insist on daily commuting from a place that does have their preferred accommodations. Some presenters may also have special dietary needs and/or preferences. Will the presenter require internet access while in the parish?
- In addition to travel and lodging expenses, a stipend is provided from the parish.
 - Some presenters have a set, non-negotiable stipend, often beginning at \$250 per presentation and ranging upwards to several thousand dollars for the presentations over several days/nights.
 - Some presenters ask to take up a freewill offering each night of the mission.
 Some identify this offering as being for themselves, some for their religious community's ministry, some for a particular project or ministry that they are supporting.
 - Often presenters do not explain to mission participants that a freewill offering is in addition to their parish-paid travel expense; some even give the impression (perhaps unintentionally) that any freewill offering or stipend helps defray their travel expense when, in fact, it is already covered by the parish.
 - In addition to costs borne by the parish, some individual parishioners will often give financial gifts to the presenter in personal appreciation.
- If the presenter is a priest who comes for the weekend preceding the mission, will he receive an additional stipend for offering weekend parish Masses?
- Some presenters may wish to sell mission-message-related items such as books, DVDs, CDs, etc.
- Presenters may be open to negotiation of finances or other arrangements.
- A cluster or grouping of parishes may help in underwriting mission expenses and increase attendance.

Scheduling

Parish missions are often conducted during Lent since it seems to be a time when Catholics are more open to spiritual renewal. However, some of the speakers already have very full Lenten schedules. You may wish to consider a time outside of Lent— perhaps October or November or even early summer (before wheat harvest begins.)

Parish Preparation

Presenters often provide materials that will assist in publicizing the upcoming mission.
This material may include posters/signs, bulletin and/or Mass announcements, pictures,
general intercessions to be used at Mass, prayer cards, links to websites, copy-ready
newspaper information, etc. Consider sending information about the upcoming missions
to neighboring parishes. Some mission presentations may also be suited to nonCatholics and warrant civic community-wide publicity. Don't forget to make use of social
media (parish website, Facebook, Twitter, texting, etc.)

- Presenters may provide, in advance of the mission, other printed materials to be copied and made available to participants. Also, the presenter may request to be available some special visual aids (e.g. props) or equipment, (powerpoint projector, wireless microphone, etc). There may be a request for particular songs to be sung, instrumental accompaniment, and/or cantor.
- Presenters, whether clergy or laypersons, from outside our diocese are required to have
 a letter of suitability which sets forth that he/she is a person of good moral character and
 reputation and has completed the Safe Environment Protocol, including a criminal
 background check. The letter of suitability shall be provided in advance of the mission
 being finally scheduled. Contact Mrs. Pamela Sullivan (785 820 8704 x 18,





Grieving Teens: What Adults Need To Know

One of the most common questions I am asked as a grief specialist is about helping a teenager after a loss. Parents often complain that their teens communicating them, or won't open up to them. Teens often say that they would open up more if their parents weren't so busy judging and criticizing them. Teens share that they feel that their parents are often out of touch, too busy to listen, too controlling or don't respect their privacy. Yet these same kids often want their parents to support them and offer some guidance when they are coping with tough stuff such as a loss. They also need time with friends and time alone. It is hard enough being a teenager, but to have to cope with grief as well can feel overwhelming at times.

Teens are trying to separate from parents and become more independent, yet after a loss they find themselves conflicted. They want to handle it on their own, yet often also want adult support, understanding and patience.

Grieving teens often will say things like, "Life stinks," "This is not fair that I have to go through this," "You don't really care about me," "My life wasn't supposed to turn out this way," etc. It feels unfair to a teen to lose someone close to them through death. Teens feel

immortal; deaths of siblings, parents or friends can rock their world. Expectations are high and hormones may be raging. Adults are allowed to take some time off of work, college kids can drop out for a semester but teenagers have to go back to school and keep up the frantic pace of life, even after a loved one or friend has died.

Three feelings that make grief so hard for teens are anger, guilt and shame. They may be angry at the person who died who has now messed up their life. They may feel angry at the person for leaving them. They could feel angry at God for letting this bad thing happen, angry at their friends who still may have their loved ones and angry at the world for not getting how hard this is on them.

Teens often complain that their parents are micromanaging their lives. They want to know every move they make. They want to be in constant contact via cell phones. Teens often feel angry when adults treat them differently than they did before the death.

Guilt can cause a lot of pain for grieving teens. Many teens feel guilty that they didn't spend more time with the person who died or regret that they weren't nicer. One 14 year old boy I met last year shared that he and his dad had a major blow up one night and hours later, his dad suffered a massive heart attack and died. This young man was full of guilt that he never got to apologize to his father. I listened. I reminded him that it is normal for teens to fight with their parents and that didn't change the love that he and his dad shared.

Shame also can cause much suffering for a teen. Many teens who experience a death feel very alone. Teens often hate feeling different, and losing a parent, sibling or friend can make them feel very different. They don't want to be known as the boy whose dad died or the girl whose sister was killed. This is especially hard when a loved one died by suicide, homicide or if the family member was driving a car in which others were killed. How can adults help? Let teens know you are there for them, if you are. "I am here for you, if you want to talk about it. I don't know how you feel." Teens need their losses acknowledged and validated, while at the same time they need reassurance that the intensity of their grief won't last forever. Teen bereavement groups can be great for teens. This will validate their feelings and help them to not feel so alone. Try to honor your

adolescent's need for the avoidance of intense emotions. Help to create a safe space for your kids to open up and express themselves. Encourage your teen to have creative outlets. Such things as art, music, exercise, writing, hobbies, being in nature, volunteering, working for a cause, can be very helpful. Encourage them to come up with their own list of activities.

Teens feel their emotions strongly which can also scare them. Teaching them coping skills like breathing or progressive relaxation can help. Encourage them to drink water which is very important during grief. Going for a walk is helpful, or if in school a walk to the bathroom and throw some cold water on their face. look outside a window, visit the school counselor or nurse. Prayer, music, yoga, meditation, are other things teens have shared with me that help. Sometimes screaming into a pillow and crying helps as it even lowers blood pressure, pulse rate and body temperature. Anything healthy that can reduce tension can be a good outlet.

Teens can guide their parents on how to help them by providing a list for parents on what helps. Things on the list may include: Talk about the loss, but in small doses. I want to know that we can talk about the death, that it isn't taboo. Ask me open ended questions, "how have you been since your friend died?" Tell your parents that you hate lectures. especially trapped in the car with them. Tell parents to accept what you may be feeling whether it be anger or survivor guilt or the feeling that life isn't fair. Your parents can say they miss John today, but then just leave it at that. If your parents need to talk about the loss, set a time limit like 15 minutes or less. Teens want their parents support especially now, when they may be feeling judged and criticized by others including some of their friends. Parents need to learn not to take everything a teen says or does personally. Teens want some space and some freedom. They hate feeling smothered by parents. Teens want parents to keep

talking to them, even if the teen isn't responding, they are still listening.

Many teens will find writing in a journal helpful. I was given about 100 journals written by a 17year-old girl who lost her brother three years ago. She wanted to create a small journal for kids who also lost a loved one, so that they can grieve in the privacy of their own space and time. Some teens write letters to the person who died. They can read it at the cemetery, keep the letters, share with a counselor or friend, tie it to a helium balloon and let it go, make a collage of pictures and words from a magazine, that remind them of their loss. Spend time with people who knew the person well who also want to talk about them. Some teens will find visiting with a deceased friend's family or friends helpful. Some will post memories on their person's Facebook page. Many parents who have lost teens or young adults share with me how touching it is for them to read the memories shared on Facebook. One mom told me that last Thanksgiving she was so comforted by one of her daughter's friends who had written on her Facebook Memorial Page... Teens often don't want to cry in front of others. Some teens try to forget about it and act like nothing happened and want to have fun again. Often this is followed by a feeling of guilt. Teens worry about having too little control over their emotions and wonder if their feelings are normal and which ones may mean they need help. Teens can make a list of people to call or text if they need to talk. These are safe adults who will

Teens can make a list of people to call or text if they need to talk. These are safe adults who will listen without judgment and who can offer helpful advice when needed. Teens can list a few places that make them feel safe. They can list a few activities that help them to feel better. They can list a few affirmations or statements that can help them get through the rough times.

Eventually teens may find or make meaning from their loss. Some


teens who have lost a friend to drunk driving may become involved in MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving). Some will join a support group like Compassionate Friends (for bereaved parents and siblings). Some teens will start a group at school and educate their peers about whatever it was their person died of. Others' may start a 5K and run in memory of a friend or loved one.

Teens find ways to keep those connections to the person who died. Some listen to their person's favorite music, TV show or eat a favorite meal. Sometimes teens talk about a place their loved one liked so when ever they are at a place like that they think of them.

More ways to keep the connection:

Go to their favorite restaurant or cook their favorite meal. Celebrate their birthday with family and friends. Write songs or poems about them. On the anniversary of the person's death, spend the day doing things they enjoyed doing. Create Web pages in their honor. Burn CD's with their favorite songs or make a play list and with friends and family. Volunteer for an organization or cause your loved one believed in. Wear something that was theirs or carry it in your pocket. And perhaps to celebrate your person's life, do something you've always wanted to do but haven't yet done.

God's arms are around us in the cocoon gently guiding the transformation towards healing and hope.

My path as a widow has had many twists and turns and at times I have asked myself where God is. I have realized that God is guiding me through the darkest times even when I feel I am all alone. This weekend as I sat outside going through one of those twists and turns I saw a butterfly flying around me. I looked and thought of the transformation this beautiful butterfly had. I looked at this beautiful butterfly with a smile and a hello. The butterfly softly landed on my foot and stayed a bit. God's presence is there.
