OFFICE OF THE BISHOP

WORLD DAY FOR CONSECRATED LIFE will be celebrated the weekend of February 7-8, 2015 in parishes. In 1997, Pope John Paul II instituted a day of prayer for women and men in consecrated life. This celebration is attached to the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord on February 2. This feast is also known as Candlemas Day; the day on which candles are blessed symbolizing Christ who is the light of the world. So too, those in consecrated life are called to reflect the light of Jesus Christ to all peoples. Please pray for those who have made commitments in the consecrated life, and be sure to thank them on their special day. May they continue to be inspired by Jesus Christ and respond generously to God's gift of their vocation. Go to the USCCB website www.usccb.org/consecratedlife for more information and resources.

23nd WORLD DAY OF THE SICK 2014: On February 11, 2015. Pope John Paul II initiated this day in 1992 to encourage people to pray for those who suffer from illness and for their caregivers. World Day of the Sick was first observed on February 11, 1993. February 11 is also the Catholic Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, which is a name given to the Virgin Mary in honor of the apparitions that were said to have been seen in and around Lourdes, France, by a young girl named Bernadette Soubirous. It would be especially appropriate to include petitions for the sick and for health care providers on this day as well as thanking those who care for the sick and elderly. The Pope underlines the Church's fundamental role in "lovingly and generously accepting every human being, especially those who are weak and sick".

NATIONAL MARRIAGE WEEK (FEB. 7-14), WORLD MARRIAGE DAY (SUNDAY, FEB. 8) and VALENTINE'S DAY (FEB. 14) all provide opportunities

to strengthen individual marriages, reduce the divorce rate, and build a stronger marriage culture, which in turn helps curtail poverty and benefits children. Together we can make more impact than working alone. Please join with others by providing an opportunity to celebrate the gift and blessing of marriage and to affirm and support engaged and married couples. ASH WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 18TH. Lent is a time of grace and renewal for the entire Church, especially for the catechumens and candidates preparing for initiation during the Easter Triduum. The three traditional ascetical practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving are important pillars for a fruitful experience of Lent. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting (for those 14 through 59) and abstinence (for those 14 and over). The Fridays of Lent remain days of abstinence

RITE OF ELECTION February 22nd, Hays at 3:00 p.m. and March 1st, Salina, at 3:00

p.m. I will again be sending letters to the candidates and the catechumens. All names of candidates or catechumens need to be submitted to the Liturgy office no later than Feb. 18th for Hays and Feb. 24th for Salina. Refer to the Office of Liturgy for more detailed information. **THE CHRISM MASS** will be held at Sacred Heart Cathedral, 11:30 a.m. on Thursday, March 26, 2015 with a luncheon following.

SACRAMENTAL RECORDS: The new round of Confirmations is beginning this month. On the occasion of the celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation, please have the books containing the sacramental records of your parish available for review. If several parish communities are together for a single celebration, please provide the records of each parish. Also all parishes are reminded to complete the Confirmation Liturgy Guide and mail to the Bishop's Office at least seven working days prior to Confirmation. (See Section VI-7B of the Diocesan Handbook) or on the Diocesan Web site under the Bishop's Section, you will find the Confirmation Schedule and the Confirmation Liturgy Guide which is a fillable form for your convenience.) The completed form along with the letters from the Candidates should be mailed to my office at least seven days prior to the date scheduled for Confirmation.

OFFICE OF THE VICAR GENERAL

CATHOLIC RELIEF SERVICES (formerly ACOAF) COLLECTION is scheduled for the weekend of March 15, 2015. This collection is the principal means through which the Church in the United States is able to respond to international relief efforts. BAPTISMAL RECORDS: Please check your records to see when the last time was that records of baptisms were sent in to the Chancery. For the large parishes this should be done every year. For the small parishes maybe only every two or three years. Enclosed is the form used for recording your baptisms. If you need more of these forms you can email Darlene at chancery@salinadiocese.org. Also, this may be done electronically. Darlene, the Chancery secretary, has the template for this and can email it to you. For those receiving this SDNB by email, the template is attached. You can fill it out and return it to her by email.

MAILING OF CHECKS AND CORRESPONDENCE TO THE CHANCERY In recent years, due to changes in both chancery and parish staff, there has been some confusion about checks and correspondence going to the chancery office. Attached is a sheet containing helpful information in making sure your mailings are reaching the correct recipient.

TRIBUNAL/JUDICIAL VICAR

COMMONLY ASKED QUESTIONS: May a Catholic couple who has been married "outside the Church" have their marriage "convalidated"?

Sometimes a Catholic enters into marriage without following the proper canonical form or when a canonical impediment is present which prevents them from validly entering into marriage. Canonical form for a Catholic is to exchange consent in the presence of a properly delegated priest or deacon unless they have petitioned for a dispensation from this form and received it from the bishop of the diocese or his delegate. Catholics who gets married 'outside the church' may wish to have their marriage validated in the Church. This is usually referred to as "convalidation" (sometimes incorrectly referred to as a 'blessing' of the marriage). Convalidation involves the couple renewing their consent in the present of a priest or deacon, and two witnesses, observing the canonical form. In the case of an impediment which prevented the Catholic from getting married in the Church, this impediment must for formally dispensed or be no longer present before the consent may be renewed. Examples

of impediments that would need to be resolved prior to a convalidation could include a previous marital bond by one or both parties, a prior publicly professed perpetual religious vow and age/too young at time of original consent. When preparing a couple for convalidation, the Church's minister should complete the same prenuptial form and secure the usual required documentation as they would for a couple who is not married.

OFFICE OF LITURGY

1. Reminders for the Rite of Election

On the morning of the first Sunday of Lent, the parish should celebrate the PARISH CELEBRATION FOR SENDING CATECHUMENS FOR ELECTION AND CANDIDATES FOR RECOGNITION BY THE Bishop, nos. 530-546 in the RCIA Ritual. Catechumens should sign the Book of Elect during that rite (see no. 539). Parishes whose Rite of Election is celebrated on the Second Sunday of Lent should celebrate the Rite of Sending on that day.

Bring your Book of Elect to the Diocesan Rite of Election. Names of the elect will be read from this book and presented to the bishop.

Instructions for the Rite:

A. The people in the procession are:

catechumens and candidates

sponsors

RCIA directors

pastors.

They should gather in the parish hall.

Family members and guests are not in the procession. They should go to the church before the ceremony begins.

B. The front pews are reserved for the people in the procession.

OFFICE OF LITURGY(cont.)

- C. Catechumens/candidates should sit on the left side of the church; sponsors, directors, and pastors should sit on the right side of the church.
- D. The RCIA director comes to the ambo when the name of the parish is called. S/he calls out the names in this way:
 - "I present for baptism... (all those names)
 - "I present for full communion... (all those names)

The catechumens and candidates come to the front as the names are being called. They should all leave the pew immediately, not waiting for their names to be called (think liturgical procession rather than graduation ceremony). The bishop will greet each one individually, after which they return to their seats. When the director finishes reading the names, s/he gives the Book of Elect to the bishop, who signs it.

- 2. The Chrism Mass is at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Thursday, March 26, at 11:30 a.m.
- 3. According to sunset times given for April 4, the Easter Vigil should not begin before 8:30 p.m.

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MAILINGS TO THE CHANCERY

- 1. If you are sending something to a particular person or office in the chancery, please write Attn: Youth Office, or Attn: Karen Taylor, etc. on the outside of the envelope. This prevents the receptionist from having to open each piece of mail and protects confidentiality.
- 2. If you are mailing a check to the chancery and are not sure what office it goes to, it is best to just make the check payable to the Diocese of Salina, then notate in the memo line, which collection or office it is for. Some of the banks are getting particular on this.
- 3. When mailing several checks or items to the chancery at once, it is perfectly fine to tuck them into a large envelope and send them to Renee's attention. She will get them where they need to go.
- 4. As you will see from the following list, we have several people in the office who handle several separate bank accounts, for that reason we ask that you DO NOT COMBINE PAYMENTS into one check. We need a separate check for each payment.

Possible Parish Activities for Evangelization in and through the Family Diocese of Salina Office of New Evangelization February, 2015

February 7-8, 2015 marks this year's observance of World Marriage Day. The office of New Evangelization offers some simple ideas for evangelization in and through the family, in particular related to World Marriage Day. (Note: if necessary for parish scheduling, a World Marriage Day activity could also easily be conducted on the weekend of February 14-15.)

Married couples could be recognized at weekend parish Masses.

- Marriage vows could be renewed and/or an anniversary-type blessing could be offered to married couples who are present.
- A token of recognition could be offered, such as a single-stemmed rose, to each married couple present.
- Special recognition could be given to the longest and the most recently married couple. One
 option is presenting each such couple (who are present at each weekend Mass) with a gift
 certificate/card for dinner at a local restaurant.

Married couples could be asked to respond to the question: "What is it about my spouse that helps me to be a better Christian and/or disciple of Jesus?" Responses could be publicized through the parish bulletin, website, Facebook page, etc.

Not all marriages are happy all the time. The "Prayer to St. Rita for Troubled Marriages" could be distributed. The prayer text:

St. Rita, make us understand that a vocation is not only a matter of attraction. Enable us to see clearly that it is also a matter of finding in ordinary events, God's will for us and then accepting it even if it seems to be baffling and contrary to our wishes. Teach those called by the Lord to the married state to reflect deeply on the delicate choices that will influence their destiny. Let them not be deceived by their feelings; instead, let them look for the solid qualities that keep a home united in the joy of the Lord. Teach unhappy spouses the power of patience and mildness. Let them not give way to discouragement but, like you, let them endeavor to save both the happiness of their home and the soul of their spouse. St. Rita, we pray this prayer through you and in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

(This is the fifth of nine tools to facilitate brief faith-sharing at a parish meeting in keeping with the theme of the 2014-15 catechetical year, Teaching about God's Gift of Forgiveness. These articles are provided by the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston, via the New Evangelization Office of the Diocese of Salina. Suggested use: this handout could be provided to meeting participants in advance, to give them the opportunity to reflect on the Teaching Tool content and the Reflection Question. As a meeting opening, the Teaching Tool content could be read aloud, followed by a few minutes' discussion of the Reflection Question.)

Tool 5: The Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation and the gift of forgiveness.

Teaching tool

In many ways the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation is by far the clearest example of God's gift of forgiveness. By Christ's will, the Church possesses the power to forgive the sins of the baptized. This is normally exercised through bishops and priests in the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. One who desires to obtain reconciliation with God and with the Church, is obliged to confess to a priest all the unconfessed grave sins they remember after having carefully examined their conscience. This is the only ordinary means by which the Church in the name of Christ can reconcile a person with God and the Church. Because of this, one of the Church's precepts is that, "You shall confess your sins at least once a year."

The regular confession of even venial sins is highly encouraged. It helps to form one's conscience, and lets one be healed by Christ and progress in the life of the Spirit. In response to God's mercy and compassion, true penitence involves a conversion of heart. This authentic conversion entails a sorrow and abhorrence for sins committed, a firm disposition to discontinue sinning, as well as the necessary action to turn from evil and remain united with God

In whichever form the celebration of the rite takes, the four essential elements of the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation remain: repenting for the sins committed, confessing sins to the priest, receiving absolution, and doing penance and correcting any wrong that was done.

Celebrating the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation is one of the deepest and most profound ways we can experience God's gift of forgiveness.

Reflection Ouestion

Think about the first time you celebrated the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. In what ways has your experience of this sacrament matured with you over time? Do you experience this sacrament as a joyful celebration designed to assist you to live more fully as a disciple of Jesus Christ?

Are You Dreading Valentine's Day?

When I went through my divorce Valentine's Day was one of the most dreaded days of the year. I hated it. The endless scenarios of people falling in love or frolicking on sun baked beaches all confirmed that I was a failure. During that season of loss and grief my friends tried to tell me I was a terrific person. But I felt like an ugly, rejected loser who couldn't keep a husband, and Valentine's Day was the proof.

Engagement ring commercials inflicted the worst torture. watch the lovers proclaiming a life of endless bliss, pledging eternal love to each other. And the sparkling emerald-cut diamond made it all ring somehow delightfully perfect. My cynical "Yeah, would hiss, tongue someone made that vow to me once to - don't believe it!"

After several years of helping others during their divorce, and time spent listening to truth instead of the media, I discovered a handful of encouraging ways for single people to cope with the day for "lovers."

I'm not talking about an unrealistic "just don't think about it" mentality, or pretending the day doesn't evoke nostalgia or a longing for someone special. We were created for companionship, that's a God-given need.

However, my suggestion is an optimistic approach to Valentines

Day, instead of focusing on what is lacking. What if our yearnings caused us to look for beneficial ways to heal our wounds rather than tolerate them? When we take positive steps toward mending a broken heart, the result can be a healed life that thrives - whether single or married.

Here are a few practical "Survival Tips" to help a person refrain from an emotional meltdown on Valentines Day.

Connection

- Don't hibernate or wait until February 13th to make a plan. Force yourself to be with other people, even if only briefly.
- Gather same sex friends and visit a "family focused" restaurant.
 Avoid ones that cater to couples or have romantic overtones.
- Look into a church or community support group. They often have fun activities planned.
- Non-custodial parents: Bring your child a valentine or small, inexpensive gift that communicates your love.

Creativity

- Think of new, fun things to do this year such as: making handmade heart-shaped decorations, pizza, cakes or cookies.
- Try something that is completely different. Go roller-skating, skiing, hiking, bowling, climb a mountain or a walk through a museum.

- Immerse your family in assembling a model airplane, a Lego adventure, or a jigsaw puzzle.
- Have a potluck supper with each person bringing a favorite chocolate treat.

Care

- Help your child make a valentine for your ex-spouse or former in-laws. This communicates your permission for the child to love the other family, which greatly reduces his or her fear or tension.
- Splurge on a cappuccino or a box of Godiva chocolates for yourself!
- Notice a married same-sex friend who may need encouragement or a hug. While others are receiving cards, gifts, and flowers, Valentine's Day may be a reminder of a spouse who is thoughtless, cruel or unloving.
- Take a small gift to someone who is lonely or hurting such as: an exchange student, a widow or widower, an unmarried pregnant girl, someone out of work, an elderly neighbor, or a handicapped homebound person.

Considerate

- Invite friends over for dinner and use the good linens and china.
- Ladies: Indulge yourself to cozy bed linens, a new nightgown, a massage or a pedicure.
- Guys: Treat yourself to a ballgame, model train exhibit, or car show.

• Send a valentine or flowers to someone who has comforted and loved you. This day isn't solely for romantic love.

Calm

- Try a new pillow or neck exercises. They work wonders for tension.
- Make yourself a warm, comforting drink of hot cocoa or chai tea.
- Get enough sunshine. Winters's shorter daylight hours can produce depression.
- Exercise produces natural stress reducers, and it's a great way to meet new people. Many gyms have childcare available.
- Calligraphy your favorite Bible verse (Suggestions: Deuteronomy 31:6, Philippians 4:6-8, 1 Peter 5:7) or try your hand at drawing or sculpting.

Caution

- Refrain from anesthetizing loneliness with drugs or alcohol. These chemicals can induce despair which often leads to a greater sense of isolation.
- Shun the temptation to frequent bars or use sex as way to ease the pain. This decision often leads to disastrous long-term consequences.
- Avoid photographs, memorabilia, fragrances, restaurants or atmospheres which trigger memories of "what used to be."
- Steer clear of movies that focus on weddings. People falling in love, adultery, or emotinally wounded children. Instead choose films with a lighthearted, fun plot.

Positive Steps to Take in a Stepfamily Situation

The primary relationship in a marriage should be that of a couple. Create an on-going pattern of communication with each other.

- ⇒ Provide couple unity in family issues for the benefit of the children.
- ⇒ Be aware of the different lifestyles and value systems, which are being combined into your stepfamily situation.
- ⇒ Show the same respect *for* your stepchildren as you expect *from* them.
- ⇒ Consider the combined children as *ours*, not yours or *mine*.
- ⇒ Remember that your biological children know you better than your new spouse. Be aware of your over protectiveness as a biological parent.
- ⇒ Consider the children living apart from the new stepfamily as being as much a part of the stepfamily as those living within.
- ⇒ Keep communication open, whenever possible, with ex-spouses for the sake of the children.
- ⇒ Appreciate the individuality of each child in the stepfamily.
- Provide a reasonable territorial space for each family member.
- ⇒ Address financial issues before the marriage to a mutually acceptable term. Continue to negotiate monetary adjustments with each other.
- ⇒ Be flexible in resolving issues and be willing to try various alternatives. Everyone makes mistakes. If you find yourselves unable to come to a solution, see professional guidance and counseling.
- ⇒ Keep a sense of humor.
- ⇒ Raise the consciousness of your family, friends, teachers, and clergy about the uniqueness of a stepfamily.

A SAMPLE RENEWAL OF VOWS

The Celebrant invites the remainder of the congregation to pray in silence as married couples renew before God their sacred matrimonial commitment to each other.

"You stand before those who are living the single vocation in the Church. Your marriage vows complement their lives of commitment and service to the Lord's call."

"You stand before widows and widowers who recall the love and commitment given to their spouse."

"You stand before us as witnesses to the married love which Christ abundantly blessed on your wedding day. I invite you now to renew the promises you made in mutual and lasting fidelity."

Husband: For the courage to overcome fear and reveal ourselves more openly and honestly through more intimate communication. We pray to the Lord.

Wife: That all our relatives, friends and neighbors may experience the joy of family love. We pray to the Lord.

Husband: That all the families on earth may have the resources they need to lead happy, healthy and prayer-filled lives. We pray to the Lord.

Celebrant: Father, you love us so much that you gave us your only Son. Grant that all who are in the union of marriage may reflect the beauty of your love and share it with others. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Make Lent Count

That is a good way to think of Lent. By giving things up or doing something spiritual, we aren't engaged in an effort to make ourselves special; we are engaged in an effort to get close to Christ.

Here is a list of things you might consider:

Ideas for Adults

<u>Fasting</u>

Skip lunch one day a week.

Skip meat an extra day – or two – a week.

Give up alcoholic beverages.

Give up soda – even diet soda.

Give up all desserts.

Don't buy anything except groceries and absolute necessities.

Fast from listening to talk radio or music in the car.

<u>Prayer</u>

Begin – or begin again – the daily Rosary.

Meditate for 10 minutes a day – *Magnificat* offers a wonderful daily meditation.

Attend Stations of the Cross, Divine Mercy devotions or Eucharistic adoration.

Start a nightly habit of spiritual reading.

Read the Compendium of the Catechism (just four pages a day will allow you to finish it in Lent.

Almsgiving/Charity

Volunteer to deliver food to the poor.

Join the social-concerns committee at your parish.

Make a significant donation to a deserving charity with each Lenten paycheck.

Forgive someone, and tell him or her you want to patch things up.

Say a kind word to everyone you meet.

Pay one significant compliment – or more – to each of your children every day.

Offer to watch the children of a new mother or a single parent one day a week throughout Lent.

Visit an elderly friend or relative.

For Children and Teens

For younger folks, don't be afraid of the adult ideas. But if none will work for you, try these:

Look for and address a need in your house every day.

Start asking, "Is there anything else I can do?" after you do what your parents ask.

Turn off your phone except for specific times at home.

Give up video games. Yes – entirely – throughout Lent (except Sundays)!

Send a note to each grandparent, aunt, uncle and godparent during Lent.

Make a new friend outside your "crowd."

Be a friend to a shy person.

Give up that bad place, person or thing.

Choose a favorite toy, book or piece of clothing and give it away before Easter.

CELEBRATE LENT AT HOME

Lent comes from a word that means "springtime," and is celebrated for 40 days before Easter Sunday. Lent is a time of repentance, prayer and sacrifice in preparation for the great feast of Easter.

The following are family rituals and traditions that deepen family faith and relationships.

LENTEN JOURNAL:

On Ash Wednesday, make an official beginning to your Lenten season by starting a 40 page journal of what your family will do to celebrate this season. Keep a record of special prayers and activities you do together in this notebook. Children will enjoy decorating it and entering each day's activities.

HIDDEN ACTS:

Decorate a special container with pictures or designs that describe how you feel about Lent. Family members write down simple actions which each member could perform for the family, parish, or community. For one week, each member chooses a slip of paper each day and tries to carry it out. At the end of the week, members share both the times when they were able to follow through and when they found it difficult to carry out.

CENTER OF ATTENTION?

Designate your refrigerator as your "Lenten Progress" center. You might post a Lenten calendar or large paper cross and attach your personal and family pledges; whenever opening the door, you could say a short prayer for those who are hungry in the world. You might make a large map starting from Ash Wednesday and ending at Easter. At the end of each week, you could record along the path what has happened to you/your family up to that point on the journey. If you choose to give up certain foods during Lent, place wrappers or pictures of that food on the door and sign your name. Use your imagination.

THE FAMILY TABLE:

Make a simple tablecloth out of burlap or other coarse fabric. Once a week make your own Lenten place mats out of paper and decorate them with various symbols (the cross, the tomb, resurrection, cocoons, caterpillars, butterflies, scenes of winter). Eat part of your evening meal in silence. Use fresh flowers or greens on those days when the family has experienced a significant event on its Lenten journey.

EASTER TREE:

Your family might like to create an Easter Tree during Lent. Take a large branch and put into a container to hold it upright. As the season progresses, decorate it with signs of life: cracked egg shells, a leaf or green branch, pictures taken during Lent, etc. When Easter arrives your tree will be full of new life and color to symbolize Jesus' rebirth and also your own.

FAMILY LENTEN SYMBOL:

Each person in the family can carry a "family Lenten symbol" which will remind him/her during the day to think of and pray for each other (a purple piece of yarn tied to a shoelace, a small Lenten prayer card carried in a shirt pocket or purse, a homemade wooden cross on a piece of cord.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS:

Attend parish "Stations of the Cross" services as a family each week, or pray one station each day during Lent at home using different "Stations of the Cross" booklets available at religious goods stores.

A FAMILY PRAYER/GOOD DEED BASKET:

Use an ordinary Easter basket. Have each family member write the name of every person he/she promises to remember in prayer during Lent on a very small piece of paper—about a quarter inch to three inches in length. These small pieces are placed in the basket to form the straw. Pieces may be added at different intervals during Lent and should be a variety of colors. The basket can also be used to collect a listing of good deeds done by individual family members during Lent. On Easter, each family member places his/her own specially decorated Easter egg into the new basket to symbolize the spirit of new life which has been shared with others through prayers and good deeds.
