1. **Marriage Workshop**

The new Rite of Marriage will be published in August. It *may* be used after September 8, and *must* be used after December 31. The Office of Liturgy will host workshops in each vicariate to acquaint priests, deacons, and musicians with the changes from the current rite. All workshops will be in the church, so we can envision how the procession and other parts of the rite will look. PASTORAL MINISTRY FORMATION

1. We are beginning a new certification program in Liturgy. **Formation in Liturgy** welcomes all involved in liturgical ministry: lectors, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, ushers, greeters, sacristans, music ministers, priests, deacons, liturgy commission members, RCIA teams, art & environment committees, and members of the assembly.

To obtain the Diocesan Certification in Liturgical Ministry one needs to complete the two core courses and three electives for credit. A paper or project mutually decided upon by the student and the coordinating instructor is also required.

This should not be understood as all-or-nothing. Everyone should feel free to take just one or two of the courses for their own personal enrichment, to brush up on one's understanding of the liturgy, that most sacred act that the Church performs to the glory of God and the sanctification of people.

It has been a great two years working in the Respect Life Office. However, life circumstances have changed and we have resigned from the Office of Respect Life. Kansans for Life has developed a church bulletin project entitled "In the beginning". It follows the development of a child named "Chris" in the womb. The bulletin messages begin on March 15th to prepare for Feast of the Annunciation on March 25th and ends near Christmas on December 20th. It mirrors the fetal development of Jesus Christ. This is a great way to spread the pro-life message while honoring the child Jesus. The bulletin announcements can be found at http://www.kfl.org. For the bulletin on June 5th (week 11)

Chris is almost 2 inches long. Fingers and toes are separated. Chris could easily stand on daddy's little finger nail. Chris's feet are the size of the Precious Feet pins that have become the symbol of the pro-life movement. Finger nails and hair are starting to grow. The placenta is now providing nutrition from the mother. Chris likes pizza. "They, no less than I, were created in the womb by the same God who shaped us all within our mothers." Job 31:15 The Holy Spirit is "the Lord the giver of Life," to each of us, and to the Church.

For the bulletin on June 12th (week 12)

Chris now sleeps, awakens, and exercises the muscles energetically (we should take some lessons from this). Turning of the head, curling of the toes, making a fist, opening and closing the mouth while "breathing" the amniotic fluid to help develop the respiratory system, Chris is very active in the womb. Chris is still a lightweight – weighing about one ounce – about as much as a letter. If the doctor uses a Fetal Doppler, it won't be the weather that is seen but the baby's heartbeat is heard which sounds like galloping horses. "But the angel said to him, 'Zechariah, do not be afraid, your prayer has been heard..." Luke 1:13

For the bulletin on June 19th (week 13) Father's Day

Chris now has teeth buds for all 20 teeth. Teething will come later. Chris is almost 3 inches long and weighs in at one ounce. Chris is still exercising and practicing inhaling and exhaling. All Chris's nourishment is now coming through the placenta. Vocal cords begin to form, and although they may not be ready for a rock band, Chris will use them immediately following birth for that first cry! Now mother usually feels better and has more energy. She's spreading the good news. "God blessed them (Adam and Eve), saying to them, 'Be fruitful, multiply, fill the earth...'" Gen. 1:28 Gen. 9:1 Chris' body is forming, just like The Body of Christ was formed in the womb of Mary. Happy Father's Day!

For the bulletin on June 26th (week 14)

Chris' taste buds are working! "I drink more amniotic fluid and it tastes sweet. My skin is transparent and is very sensitive to pain except for my back and the top of my head. I may be small, but I am growing fast!" Mother enjoys fireworks and celebrates the birth of our nation, but Chris won't hear anything, yet. "I set before you life and death, blessing or curse. Choose life, then, so that you and your descendants may live." Det. 30:19

For the bulletin on July 3rd (week 15)

"Soon I will be able to grasp with my hands. What will I grasp? My other hand! Did you know that I have my own unique fingerprints now? My fingernails and toenails are growing. I also have an adult's taste buds. My eyebrows and hair on my head are sprouting. But it will probably change color and texture after birth. I'm kicking, twisting, and flailing really hard." But, mother can't feel Chris moving in the womb, yet. "Did you not . . . clothe me with skin and flesh, and weave me of bone and sinew?" Job 10:13 **OR** "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Dear Father or PLC:

Unless I am first given the chance to review any *Voter Guide* in question, and give specific approval for its use, I do not want any *voter guides* distributed by parishes or Catholic organizations affiliated with the Diocese of Salina. Such documents may violate I.R.S. tax codes related to political activities by churches that claim tax exemption.

Can clergy speak out? Yes, speaking out in favor of, or in opposition to, specific <u>issues</u> is permitted (e.g., a homily, bulletin insert, or newsletter article in opposition to abortion, the death penalty, euthanasia, etc.). I strongly encourage you to speak out on life issues and other matters that pertain to the living out of our faith. <u>However, our efforts must not be linked to endorsing or condemning specific candidates or political parties</u>.

What is the consequence of violating the political activity prohibition? Your church's 501(c)(3) tax-exemption may be revoked if it engages in any prohibited activity. For example, the Internal Revenue Service, in 1995, revoked the tax exemption of the Church at Pierce Creek in upstate New York after the church paid for newspaper advertisements in opposition to a presidential candidate in the 1992 election. Revocation would result in the organization's income for the year becoming subject to income tax.

Voter guides — are they prohibited? The term "voter guide" refers either to a compilation of candidates' positions based upon candidates' responses to questions posed or to a neutral compilation of candidates' positions on the issues. I am not forbidding all voter guides. However, voter guides must be unbiased. Several examples I have reviewed in recent years would not appear to meet the strict guidelines of the IRS. For this reason I wish to reiterate that I do not permit voter guides to be used by any parish, church or affiliated Catholic organization without my prior review and consent. If persons are found on your property, especially parish parking lots, disseminating voter guides or other political statements please order them to stop.



Liturgy exists for mission



In the Catholic Church, the Holy Eucharist is called the Mass – it is from the Latin word for dismissal. This word serves as a reminder that, as much as worship is about gathering as community, it is just as much about, going into the world to love and serve the Lord. Thanks be to God.

So whenever we pray, whenever we worship, we should view ourselves as participating in the life, work, mission and love of God. Our liturgies call us into a work for justice, freedom, peace and righteousness. Our liturgies remind us of that profound call to love God and neighbor with our whole, mind, heart and strength.

Fall 2019 --- Celebrating Crossing Cultural Boundaries (Elective – 1hr credit)

Offered via I-TV at sites across the Dioceses of Dodge City and Salina.



This course seeks to explore ways of finding an appropriate response to varied expressions of spirituality in our churches and communities. How can our liturgies and worship express and celebrate the richness and creativity of our new multicultural reality as well as deepen our own spirituality? The aim of the course is to share our experience of working cross-culturally, look at changing liturgical and spiritual needs and explore possibilities of finding a way forward.

Liturgy is symbolic and uses ritual as language

Formation in Liturgy welcomes all involved in liturgical ministry: Lectors, Ministers of Holy Communion, Ushers, Greeters, Sacristans, Music Ministers, Priests, Deacons, Liturgy Commission Members, RCIA teams, Art & Environment Committees, Members of the Assembly.

An actor rehearsing his or her part in a play might ask the director: "What's my motivation here?" The script may call for the actor to say certain words, to perform a particular action, or to relate to another character in a specific way. But to properly play her or his part, the actor must know what is motivating the character he or she is playing.

The same is true for those who exercise liturgical ministry. Just as an actor needs more than a script and stage directions to bring the role to life, so, too, do liturgical ministers.

Those serving the liturgy of the Church need to have an understanding of the liturgy, an appreciation of particular ministries and their relationship to other ministries, and a willingness to give of their time and talent for the glory of God and for the sake of the assembly.

Liturgical ministers need to have an understanding of and an appreciation for the proper motivation of the liturgy and the various liturgical ministries. Without this understanding and appreciation, liturgical ministers may simply go through the motions like actors who do not appreciate or understand the roles they are playing.

Bishop Weisenburger and Bishop Brungardt encourage every parish to have one or more parishioners prepared with a Liturgy Certificate so they serve the parish as a resource for the source and summit of the life of the parish, the Liturgy.

Fall 2016 --- Sacramental Theology (Core Course – 3hrs credit)

Offered via I-TV at sites across the Dioceses of Dodge City and Salina.



This course will examine Christian worship and sacramental life in light of both its historical and theological development and the liturgical action that shapes this communal faith. It will focus on why a Christian community of faith gathers and the claims this sacramental expression makes concerning God's gracious self-communication in Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit. The course explores the community's identity as the Body of Christ and the proclamation of the Good News in the contemporary world. Special attention will be given to Catholic Parish life and its corporate celebrations, particularly of Eucharist, where the community's act of praise and thanksgiving is most concretely expressed.

Spring 2019 --- Celebrating the Rites of the Catechumenate (Elective – 1hr credit)

Offered via I-TV at sites across the Dioceses of Dodge City and Salina.



The rites of the process of Christian initiation of adults are studied from historical, theological, liturgical, and pastoral perspectives. Beginning with the text of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, students reflect on the order and integrity of each of the rites. Working from this foundation, they explore appropriate ritual adaptation and receive guidance for the adapting and enrichment of the rites.

Fall 2018 --- Art and Environment (Elective – 1hr credit)
Offered via I-TV at sites across the Dioceses of Dodge City and Salina.



A liturgical environment that celebrates the awe of God's presence and saving deeds cannot be satisfied with anything less than the beautiful. The beautiful is related to the holy. This course gives Ministers of Environment and Art and Sacristans a knowledge of the sacraments, the Catholic rites, the Liturgical Year, and the faithful's devotional life in order to equip them to create a sacred environment in which the divine-human encounter can most readily occur. Their goal is to care for all the elements of worship, insuring that the total environment is clean, appropriate, authentic, beautiful and accessible. The course will present the Liturgical Documents as they pertain to sacraments and other rites, environment, liturgical space, church appointments and the sacristy.

Spring 2017 --- Music and Liturgy (Elective – 1hr credit)

Offered via I-TV at sites across the Dioceses of Dodge City and Salina.



This course gives those interested or involved in divine worship guidelines regarding a theology of liturgy, the role of the pastoral musician, and even what is important when choosing music for the liturgy. The course will emphasize appropriate music for the liturgy. First priority will be given to singing the liturgy itself: chant as well as metric settings for the Mass. As suggested in liturgical documents, the Three Judgments, musical, liturgical, and pastoral, can help guide our musical choices.

Fall 2017 --- Worship and Faith (Core Course – 3hrs credit)

Offered via I-TV at sites across the Dioceses of Dodge City and Salina.



The Church's Creeds evolved out of a doctrinal concern, but they were always more than doctrine; they were prayed by the Christian community. The way the Church prayed her faith, primarily in the Eucharistic gathering, even contributed to the formation of the New Testament. For every generation, the principle gateway into the faith is the way it worships. Thus worship must be regarded as one of the most vigorous and central elements of the Pastoral Ministry Formation curriculum. This course will consider the relationship between liturgical prayer and religious imagination, focusing particularly on the meaning liturgy can have for contemporary Catholics, as well as present day challenges.

Liturgy is the work of the people, of the whole Christian community in all times and places. Christian worship isn't just whatever Christians fee

all times and places. Christian worship isn't just whatever Christians feel like making it at any given point. Worship unites the local congregation and the larger body of Christ. As such, liturgical ministers need to have a



clear commitment to core principles and practices that represent the best of our liturgical traditions and a sensitivity to the local setting at the same time. "Get Equipped" is an in-person

experience of liturgical ministries. We will especially focus on these ministries in *theory and practice*:

<u>Lectors</u> who are chosen by the Christian community and entrusted by God to proclaim God's transforming word during the Church's worship. To do this, they are expected to read and reflect upon the scriptures in prayer so as to be effective instruments for God.

<u>Eucharistic Ministers</u> who assist the presider in offering the Body and Blood of the Lord to the congregation share an intimate role as the Lord encounters his disciples. This intimate role deserves the preparation, attention, and care one can give to what is often referred to as *giving out communion*. What does it mean to be a minister of Holy Communion within and outside of Liturgy?

<u>Music Ministers</u> not only *enhance* our worship experience; they are literally *crucial*. By sharing their gift, perhaps even their charism, of music they lead us to sing in one accord to our God.

<u>Ushers/Greeters/Ministers of Hospitality</u> are among the first to greet visitors as they enter our doors. Hospitality is a pillar of stewardship that should especially be experienced as we gather to become one in Christ through sharing his sacred sacrificial meal.

The role of presider, deacon, and sacristan (environment committee) will also be highlighted.

Security Check: Vacation Baggage

Is the thought of a vacation too much for you to consider right now as you are grieving the loss of a loved one? Does it seem too much trouble to even think about choosing a vacation spot, deciding what to pack and doing all the things necessary to leave home for a week or two?

For me, after my two oldest children, 21 year old Denis and 19 year old Peggy, were killed in a car accident, I didn't have the energy to even think of a vacation, much less go on one. I was content to stay in "my nest" as I called my home, relishing the nearness of everything reminded me of my children. But others feel the change of scenery, getting away from the routine of daily life, leaving behind the things that scream vivid memories to them, trying a different pace, and having some time "away from it all" is what they need.

Then come the decisions. What do I bring, what will I need on this trip, and what will I definitely leave at home? Check the following list and choose what you think will make your vacation comfortable and a source of healing.

Guilt. This goes in the bottom of the suitcase – it's heavy. Stuff this inside a shoe and wear it out with time. You may need to walk with this a little longer but you may decide along the way that you did the best you could do with what you had. Only you can decide when to

discard it and feel the delight of a new outfit. It's like packing the wrong clothes and buying some new ones on your journey.

Anger. As much as you would like to leave this at home, squeeze it into your bag. It's like a mirror – it confirms you are alive. It comes in many sizes and shapes and is used on many different occasions. You might decide parts are not worth carrying any longer. Use it sparingly as you venture to express your feelings. It's like perfume, use too much and no one will want to come near you.

The "Why" Question. Don't bother to pack it. There are no answers. You would be wasting valuable space. Instead, bring "What's next, Lord?" and feel the comfort as new experiences lead you to some peaceful moments.

Sadness. This, being so familiar to you, might be the first thing you put into your suitcase, but let it be like your umbrella, used only on stormy days. Share it with another and you will find that your grief has been halved. Put it away for the next rainy day and let the sunshine do its magic.

Tears. These are essentials, like soap, that keep you feeling refreshed and renewed daily. Keep them readily available in your toiletry case or knapsack. They cleanse the spirit and release pain. They can be used in private or in public for many

occasions. If handy, a spouse, friend or strong shoulder could be vour "blotter."

Helplessness. These are outfits you thought would need, but rarely use. They just don't fit the climate of your destination. Just place them in the bottom of your suitcase and forget about them. They are good for protecting something fragile in your bag, like a framed photo you might like to bring along.

Patience. Bring several packs of this. Learn to take your time and go at your own pace, using your timetable, not one designed by others. Take a day at a time so your traveling can be savored. It's like chewing gum — refreshing, comforting and relaxing. Stick with it and you can savor it's nourishing ingredients.

Forgiveness. This travels well, like a band-aid, much lighter than grudges. Pack as much as you can, some for yourself and some for others. Use it to layer the garments in your bag. It can prevent wrinkles, soothe spirits and make your burden lighter.

Vulnerability. This is very fragile. Slip it into your bag wrapped in a favorite memory, song, picture, poem or prayer, protecting it like bubble-wrap. Wear it until it's out of fashion and replace it with a stronger material like hope.

Hugs. Keep them handy in your purse or jacket pocket. Remember,

it takes four hugs a day for survival, eight hugs a day for maintenance and twelve hugs a day for growth. They take up little space and are good for cushioning other things in your life. They are nonfattening, theft-proof, nontaxable and fully returnable.

"If Onlys." These might be too big to fit into your carry-on bag and they might set the alarm off at the airport checkpoint. Security might confiscate them since they only allow the 3 oz. size. You will find that they are disposable and will enjoy the resulting freedom as you shed them and choose the way to grieve that is best for you. They're like those awful shoes that give you painful blisters — get rid of them and seek something more comfortable.

Hope. This does not take up much room. It is a healthy habit, like a vitamin, recommended to be used on a daily basis. It diminishes that tremendous void in your life and energizes you. It is elastic, expanding to make room for other good things you encounter on your journey.

Positive Attitude. This is better than a cell phone. Store it in a side pocket and use it when there are glitches in your travel plans or when black clouds hang over you. Lightweight, it is easy to carry and it tends to make all your outfits sparkle. Using it, you can reach out and touch someone.

These resemble a Memories. light flowing garment that packs easily, allowing you to fill lots of spaces with happy moments that bring joy to your heart. Carry as many with you as you can fit into your bag and add some new ones as you travel. They are like comfy bunny slippers. You wouldn't ao anywhere without them, especially after a day of sightseeing, hiking or shopping.

Courage. Make sure you pack a good supply. Use it plentifully and get refills along the way. Keep it in a handy compartment, ready to use when needed and to share with others. It's like a refreshing bottle of water, reviving you when you feel exhausted or down. It might even feel like a glass of champagne as you toast yourself for doing new things.

Pampering. This is mandatory for your vacation. Now is the time to take good care of yourself, not out of selfishness, but out of wisdom. It's like a camera – focused on you, bringing smiles and building memories. Keep it on top, easy to reach and use, featuring the "new" you.

Rose-Colored Glasses. These are a must when you are lost or feeling down, helping you to sort out hidden opportunities or find silver They give you a linings. change in perspective and add a rosy hue to even the toughest days. They enable you to see things differently and perhaps allow others to look at you differently. They don't take up much room and can add a whole new dimension to your view.

Prayers. Make room for some special words that open your heart to healing. Pack them in the outside zipper compartment, easy to get to when you need a lift. Prayers are simply talking, talking to God who is always there to listen and cry with you no matter where you are. Collect them like postcards ready to share their message with others or simply to "relive" the wonders of your vacation.

Calendar. Keep this handy to check daily. It doesn't have

to be full but should have enough to keep you in a happy routine. Having something to look forward to gives your heart a boost. You will find that a date on your calendar gives meaning to your day. It's like a cup of tea, always invigorating and a real "pick-meup."

Sense of Humor. Don't' leave home without it. Stuff it in your bag and use it as much as possible. Don't be stingy. It lightens the load and makes the day brighter. It's like comfy underwear – makes you feel good all over.

Journaling. Tuck a tiny notebook in your side pocket. Write about your grief journey, recording your ups and downs. It allows you to "pour out" your , frustration, anger and sorrow and to "fill up" by counting your blessings. It's like wheels on your luggage — helping you to scoot along at an easy pace.

Meditation. This fits into those vacant spaces of your suitcase. Using it regularly on plane, bus, train, car or chaise lounge allows you to sort out your feelings, renew your strength and get in touch with your inner self. It permits you to dump useless items in your luggage and to acquire more comfortable ones. It is soothing to frayed spirits and gives direction to lost souls. It's like a top-notch Tourist Guide Book, pointing you to interesting places.

May you pack all the right things for your grieving heart and may you learn the secrets of "lightweight" luggage.

PEEK INSIDE for new activities your family can enjoy together this summer and develop summer family traditions of your own!

SUMMER (sum er), n. the part of the year between spring and autumn; the hottest months, as from mid-June to the middle of September.

That may be Webster's definition of summer, but most students simply define summer as "No School." To a family, the definition further includes orchestrating schedules, swimming, playing ball, visiting relatives, going to summer school, vacationing and spending time together as a family. If you are looking for some good ideas of fun family summer activities, read on!

Christmas, birthdays and other holidays are rich with tradition. Most families have summer traditions of which they may not even be aware: the family reunion, the family camp-out, etc. In addition to the old ones, why not create some new traditions which will be special to your family? Try to include as many family members of all ages as possible: Mom, Dad, children of all ages, aunts, uncles, cousins, grandparents.

- 1. Celebrate on June 30. It's Half-Year's-Eve, so get together with friends and have a party!
- Spend an afternoon or evening looking at old photo or wedding albums, baby books, scrapbooks, or family videos to review your family history together.
- Research and design a family tree for as far back in your ancestry as possible. Rediscover your family's origins. Use your senior family members as sources of information and anecdotes.
- Interview your grandparents or parents. Learn about their daily lives growing up: first date, favorite color, childhood pet, best friend, etc. and keep a journal or videotape.

- 5. Eat a family dinner by candlelight. Use the good dishes, make place cards and/or placemats, share meal planning and preparation, and say a special family prayer.
- 6. Fix your bikes and head out for a family bike ride. Bring along a picnic lunch.
- 7. Don a swimsuit and get wet! Run through the sprinkler, slide on the waterslide, hop in the pool!
- 8. Plan a family slumber party complete with sleeping bags, movies and popcorn. Expand even further to a backyard campout in the tent. Roast marshmallows on the grill and tell spooky stories.
- 9. Arrange a special dinner date involving a parent/grandparent or aunt/uncle and one child.
- 10. Organize an ongoing tournament in your own family using your favorite card or board games.
- 11. Play your own family trivia game. How did Mom and Dad meet? Who are Jimmy's godparents? Who was Annie's pretend playmate?
- 12. Create, direct and videotape a family play, talent show or news update. Make several copies to keep and to send to distant family members.
- 13. Volunteer as a family to help an elderly friend or relative.
- 14. Visit the library. Look up the front page of the newspaper for the day each family member was born.
- 15. Allow each child to stay up a half-hour later than the other children one night a week for some special time with Mom

and/or Dad!

16. Begin each family car ride with a family prayer.

17. Collect several big boxes (refrigerator, stove, etc.) and all work

together to build a family clubhouse.

18. Surprise each child with a "Just Because You're Special" day. Spend the entire day doing whatever the child chooses to do (within limits) one-on-one with Mom/Dad giving their undivided attention.

19. Plan a special "Back to School" shopping trip with each child to purchase school supplies and clothes for the new school

20. Invite some of your children's friends to spend the day/night. This is a great time to prepare for activities, plus it gives the other parent(s) some free time. (Maybe they'll even reciprocate.)

21. Organize a family field trip to a local forest or wildlife refuge. Be prepared with binoculars, plant and bird books, and a backpack with treats! Give everyone a chance to help get ready

22. Keep a vacation diary in a scrapbook of either the whole summer as a family or of a specific trip. Get everyone involved! Supplement with individual comments, photos and drawings of special events.

Family traditions are created and evolve over time. Enjoy developing your own special summer activities as a family!
