COUNCIL OF PRIESTS' MINUTES from September 13, 2016 is enclosed.

OCTOBER IS RESPECT LIFE MONTH. Promotional and educational materials from the USCCB were mailed to each parish in September. On Respect Life Sunday, October 2, 2016 and especially throughout this month of October, please join me in reflection and prayer for the sacredness of every human being. This annual observance is a good opportunity to highlight the Church's teachings on the dignity of the human person and the sanctity of life from conception through natural death. The theme chosen for this year's Respect Life Program is: "MOVED BY MERCY" and how this truth affects both our understanding of ourselves and others and the way we live. Please refer to my letter enclosed.

DIOCESAN DAY OF MERCY (October 9th 2-4 pm). Please refer to my email of Friday September 16, 2016 containing clarification of this special opportunity designed and intended for Catholics who are marginalized or who have not been to Confession for a long time.

While the Sacrament of Reconciliation on our Diocesan *Day of Mercy* (Sunday, October 9th) is open to all Catholics, we especially ask your help in conveying the information about this special day to Catholics who are marginalized or who have not come to the Sacrament of Confession for a long time. Giving a family member, coworker, or friend a copy of the *Day of Mercy* brochure (or at least the information from the brochure) is a great evangelizing outreach effort! If you already regularly celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, please allow your hurting brothers and sisters in Christ to make use of this special opportunity on Oct. 9th, and plan on celebrating the Sacrament yourself at one of the regularly scheduled times in your parish.

MARRIAGE ANNIVERSARY MASSES are Sunday, October 25th, 3 p.m. at St. Joseph Church, Hays and on Sunday, October 30th at 3 p.m. at St. Mary Queen of the Universe Parish in Salina.

PRIESTHOOD SUNDAY is October 30th the last Sunday of October. This is a special day set aside to honor the priesthood in the United States. It is a day to reflect upon and affirm the role of the priesthood in the life of the Church as a central one. It is a good time to talk about the need for vocations to keep the priesthood vital, and about how other priests may have been an inspiration or how you experienced and answered your own calling. Priesthood Sunday sends a message to all that the sins of a few do not reflect the innocent majority, and that the parish priest, as the instrument of Christ's ministry on earth, is loved and respected by those in the parish community. Without a priest, no parish is able to be a Eucharistic Community.

It is appropriate to recall the wise instructions that Predecessors ordered that this Society be destined all the offerings collected in every diocese, parish, religious community, association and ecclesial movement throughout the world for the care of Christian communities in need and for supporting the proclamation of the Gospel even to the ends of the earth. Today too we believe in this sign of missionary ecclesial communion. Let us not close our hearts within our own particular concerns, but let us open them to all of humanity. This is an important day in the life of the Church because it teaches how to give, as an offering made to God, in the Eucharistic celebration and for all the missions of the world. OFFICIAL CATHOLIC DIRECTORY FORMS: Thanks to all who have forwarded the Official Catholic Directory forms to the Chancery (Parishes – blue; Schools – Pink; Institutions – White). There are a few parishes that have not yet sent them in. We update the Official Catholic Directory in November for next year's book. If you have not yet received these forms from the OCD offices Darlene has them on computer. Please let her know and she can email one to you. EXPLANATION FOR FORMS: Some of the forms are coming back with the wrong figures on the Statistical Overview Section. When they ask for number of registered parishioner households, they are asking for the total number of units. When they ask for estimated number of individual Catholics, they are asking for the Total Number of Men, Women and Children in your parish. These numbers should be comparable to the numbers on your Annual Reports sent into the diocese.

WAGE AND HOUR COMPLIANCE MANUAL: As you may be aware, the Wage and Hour Compliance Manual can now be found on the Diocese of Salina's website www.salinadiocese.org in the Human Resource section. POLITICAL ACTIVITIES ON PARISH PROPERTY: Political season once again has arrived! It is imperative that you remember that Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code prohibits organizations that are exempt from federal income tax, including Catholic organizations, from participating or intervening in political campaigns on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office. Tax exempt status could be jeopardized if a Catholic organization is found in violation of this prohibition. The Catholic Church encourages everyone to get involved in the political process; however, political activities on parish property are generally prohibited. Please be very cautious in the upcoming months.


DEPARTMENT OF LABOR EMPLOYMENT POSTERS: Throughout the year, you may receive mailings that pertain to employee related posters that either the Federal or State government mandates be displayed in the workplace site. Please be advised, specific employment posters should be displayed in a conspicuous area where employees frequent and are likely to read. For practical purposes, that usually translates to the break room. Many question which posters should be posted, as required. required law, which online by and not You http://www.dol.ks.gov/Laws/Posters.aspx, which is the website to the Kansas Department of Labor. It lists the posters that need to be posted in the workplace site. You may also download the posters free of charge from that site.

From time to time, the Department of Labor will send an auditor to places of business to inspect postings to ensure the business is in compliance with the law. If the appropriate posters are not displayed your workplace could be fined for each poster not displayed. To keep your schools and parish offices in compliance, I am recommending that each of you either download each poster (free of charge) from the above-mentioned website and post the required posters individually at your workplace site or order an all-in-one poster for Kansas from a reputable company that specializes in selling these types of posters. The all-in-one poster will contain all of the postings required in Kansas so that you won't have to clutter your workplace site with many different posters.

The USCCB Respect Life Program begins on Sunday, October 2, 2016 and continues through Sept of 2017. All parishes should have received earlier this month Respect Life Program materials direct from the USCCB, which responds to the needs of parishes, schools and other ministries for basic presentations of life issues. This year's theme designated by Pope Francis "Moved by MERCY" is especially timely in light of the renewed push for legalizing assisted suicide in many states, but is also applicable to the wide spectrum of life issues. The printed materials can also be viewed at www.usccb.org/respectlife. Other, online-only resources will continue to be posted.

The theme is displayed on the 22" x 17" poster and unpacked in the positive, one-page flyer that is ideal for use as a bulletin insert and can also be posted on a school or parish bulletin board. The flyer and poster are both double-sided with Spanish and English on the reverse sides. The set of six new Respect Life pamphlet articles use personal accounts, quotes, and practical tips to encourage respect for each person and his or her life while addressing a variety of topics: Accompanying Expectant Mothers Considering Abortion, Serene Attentiveness to God's Creation, Seven Considerations While Navigating Infertility, Every Suicide is Tragic, and Bridges of Mercy for Post-abortion Healing. These articles are available to order in either English or Spanish and are also available online as bulletin inserts (in a new format from previous years).

This year's Resource Guide has an abundance of helpful supplemental guides to use during Respect Life Month.

Dear Priests and PLC's,

As you know, we implemented some significant changes for *The Register* three years ago. The publication switched from 50 issues a year to twice monthly. The primary reason was to be able to send the newspaper to all of our Catholic families registered at a parish without substantially increasing our printing and mailing costs. Before that, only a third of households were subscribing.

Instead of requiring a subscription payment (and requiring parishes to have at least a third of their units subscribe or pay the difference) we asked for a donation. Many people accepted our suggestion to add an additional donation to their gift to help offset the cost of providing *The Register* to a family who couldn't afford to donate, and still others gave additional amounts to be added to *The Register's* endowment fund. We intend to continue this method of distributing *The Register*.

Parishioners are asked to make a \$25.00 donation to help support this important initiative. If they would like to help cover the cost of a subscription for a family who cannot afford a donation, they are asked to add an additional \$15.00 to their donation. A donation envelope will be inserted in the Nov. 11 issue of *The Register*. Your help in publicizing this and urging your parishioners to donate would be greatly appreciated.

Parishioners will be instructed to mail their donation to *The Register* in Salina. If some leave their envelopes in your collection plate, please forward them to us. You can wait until you have several to send. If checks are made to your parish, please deposit them and then mail a check to *The Register*. Again, you may wait until you have several and send **one check with the names and addresses.** In addition to using the envelope, parishioners can make donations on line at <u>salinadiocese.org/the-register</u>.

We also thank you for your parish office's cooperation in sending us address changes for your parishioners. The Post Office charges *The Register* 59 cents each time one cannot be delivered, and because they are not particularly prompt in returning those to us, sometimes we are charged for two or three undeliverable issues before we are aware of the situation. If we have not received an address change, the mailing is immediately stopped until we are advised of a new address. Prompt notification by your office helps us avoid stoppage of the newspaper to your parishioners and saves us the extra return postage.

St. Isidore of Seville



In 1997 Pope John Paul II declared Isidore of Seville the patron saint of the internet. Saint Isidore died long before the first host-to-host ARPANET connection in 1969. Saint Isidore wrote a 20 book opus Etymologies, also known as the Origins, in which he tried to record everything that was known. Published after his death in 636, it was for a thousand years considered the encyclopedia of all human knowledge. Written in simple Latin, it was all a man needed in order to have access to everything he wanted to know about the world but never dared to ask. It was a tool for those seeking wisdom much like the *INTERNET* is used now.

MARRIAGE PREPARATION

FOCCUS—The FOCCUS Inventory is designed to help engaged couples appreciate their unique relationship, learn more about themselves, and discuss topics important to their future relationship together as a married couple. Couples identify topics including communication, problem-solving, religion, dual careers, parenting, intimacy, finances and more that need to be discussed to strengthen their relationship. FOCCUS is an essential communication tool to promote healthy, happy and permanent marriages.

ENGAGED ENCOUNTER—Engaged Encounter is a retreat for engaged couples to get away from daily distractions and take time to focus on each other and the life they are starting together. Married team couples share how they are living their sacrament. The engaged couple has quality time to discuss ambitions, goals, attitudes about God, sex, money, children, and their role in the church and community. Engaged couples coming into the weekend with open minds and hearts will have a chance to deepen their relationship in a meaningful way.

CATHOLICMARRIAGEPREP.COM—An online mentor program taught by a married instructor couple. The program presents the theological and sacramental aspects of marriage and sexuality and covers the life-skills couples will need throughout their marriage. It has been especially useful for couples with irregular schedules or those separated by distance during their engagement. Online worksheets foster conversation between the couple, and are followed up with personalized feedback from their instructor mentor couple.

GOD'S PLAN FOR A JOY-FILLED MARRIAGE—A six-part study based on John Paul II's Theology of the Body. The program is a key component of marriage preparation catechesis in the theology of marriage and the gift of human sexuality. It provides a rich understanding of the teachings of the Catholic church and offers couples the tools to live them out in married life. When engaged couples understand God's plan for marriage—including a clear and pastoral explanation of the "difficult teachings"—they come away with a deeper commitment to live out their sacrament.

LIVING A JOY-FILLED MARRIAGE—A virtue based, life-skills marriage enrichment program designed to help engaged/married couples learn habits of thought and behavior that will ensure them a more joy-filled marriage. This program can be used with God's Plan For A Joy-Filled Marriage for a more complete marriage preparation offering or each can be used individually. A three stage approach is incorporated in this program: Learning, Discuss & Discover and Plan & Build. The program springs from the teachings of John Paul II's message to families and couples to seek their identity and mission in living out Christ's call to Love.

CREIGHTON MODEL FERTILITYCARE SYSTEM— The Creighton Model is a safe, natural, effective method to plan your family and understand your reproductive health. The Creighton method can be used to avoid and achieve pregnancy, overcome infertility, and find the cause of many reproductive health problems. Trained fertility care practitioners are available throughout the Salina Diocese to teach the Creighton Model FertilityCare System.

CELEBRATING HALLOWEEN, ALL SAINTS, AND ALL SOULS

October 31 . November 1 . November 2





"All Hallows Eve," or *Halloween* as it came to be called, refers to the evening before All Saints Day. This holiday originated as an ancient pagan festival for the dead. The feasts of All Souls and All Saints were placed over these old holidays by Christians and the emphasis was changed to celebrating the memory of those who were "saints" in the Christian tradition and those faithful departed souls of friends and family.

Prayer of Thanksgiving for Saints and Souls

All: We give thanks to you, O Lord our God, for all your servants and witnesses of time past:

Side 1: For Abraham, the father of believers, and Sarah, his wife,

Side 2: For Moses, the lawgiver, and Aaron, the priest,

Side 1: For Miriam and Joshua, Deborah and Gideon, and Samuel with Hannah, his mother,

Side 2: For Isaiah and all the prophets,

Side I: For Mary, the mother of our Lord,

Side 2: For Peter and Paul and all the apostles,

Side 1: For Mary and Martha, and Mary Magdalene,

Side 2: For Stephen, the first martyr, and all the martyrs and saints in every age and in every land,

Side 1: For the holy men and women in our family who have been examples of faith for us.

All: In Your mercy, O Lord our God, give us, as You gave to them, the hope of salvation and the promise of eternal life; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the first born of many from the dead. Amen. In addition to dressing up in costume and begging for candy door to door, the following are some ways to celebrate the Christian meaning of All Hallows Eve, the next day, which is All Saints Day, and the following day, the Feast of All Souls:

Saints Costumes

On the eve of All Saints, consider dressing children in saint's costumes and giving a portion of whatever goodies are collected to the poor. Or trick or treat for UNICEF.

Patron Saint Information

In preparation for All Saints Day, help each child find information about his/her name saint—or a favorite saint. Each family member can decorate a placemat or poster with the saint's name and a simple drawing (or cut-out pictures) to represent that saint.

Patron Saint Sharing

On All Saints Day, give each member of the family a picture, book or symbol of his/her name saint. Give each one an opportunity to tell the family what is important about the patron saint. Parents may wish to explain why names were chosen or tell stories about ancestors who had these names before them. Do this around a special meal or at bedtime.

Prayer

On All Souls Day, make a visit to church to pray for all your loved ones who have died. Talk about what part of those persons lives on in family traditions and memories (like Grandma's pie recipe or Uncle Pete's funny stories).

Cemetery Visit

Visit the cemetery to pray at the graves of family and friends. Talk openly about death with children. Explain to children about the new life after death. If you have forgotten or do not know about the "communion of saints," look up some information about it to share with family, emphasizing the ongoing relationship with those who have gone before us.

Decorations

Decorate your home with pictures and memorabilia of relatives and friends who have died. Make All Souls day a happy day of celebration and remembrance. Line up pictures on the mantle or kitchen shelf and leave them out long enough to show neighbors and friends.

Begin Healing

If there is a recent death in your family, take the opportunity on All Souls Day to talk with a friend or counselor about unresolved fears or feelings of loss. Purchase a good book or seek out a program that deals with the grief process. Mark this day as the beginning of your efforts to heal the loss.



ALL SAINTS Day—November 1

SIMPLE STEPS FOR "HOME MADE" SAINTS:

- A Prayerful Spirit: develop a habit of prayer—before meals and bedtime, before soccer
 games and recitals, when sick or anxious about something, when saying good-bye, when
 there is a loss, a victory, hurt feelings or happy occasions. Make all kinds of prayer a part
 of family living: spontaneous, memorized, from books or tapes, out loud, quietly to self,
 together, alone.
- 2. A Spirit of Love: Saints are experts at loving the way Jesus did: in ordinary human events like listening patiently to siblings, correcting children gently, cooking and cleaning faithfully, respecting differences in each other, sacrificing one's own desires for the good of another, setting and enforcing limits for children, visiting elderly relatives All these family actions, done in a spirit of love, are holy!
- 3. Readiness to Forgive: The ability to forgive injuries and hurts, however difficult, is a sure sign of holiness! We're on our way to sainthood when we forgive our spouse or children, reconcile with a brother or sister, uncle or aunt, continue to stay in touch with those who have hurt us, invite relatives to family gatherings even though they do not reciprocate.
- 4. A Strong Sense of Justice: Parenting is saint-making. Saints are people who probably learned early in life to take turns, share resources, respect others' rights and their property, resolve conflict peacefully, do their share of work for the common good. All these things are part of good parenting skills.
- Fidelity to Commitment: At home, we may never be martyred or suffer persecution for Christ's sake, but when we are faithful in everyday ways to spouse, children and parents, we are signs of God's faithfulness to them . . . and that's holy.
- 6. A Spirit of Peace and Joy: Someone once said, "Joy is the echo of God's life in us." Saints are people filled with joy and peace wherever they are: in kitchens doing dishes, in cars driving to school, in dark bedrooms comforting fears, on front porches welcoming family home!
- 7. A Spirit of Service and Compassion: Saints not only love God a lot, they show it in compassion and service of others. Saint-making at home happens whenever we listen with care to the frustrations and hurts of family members, labor long hours to prepare for a birthday celebration, call family members together to help with parish or community service projects, or give money and time to earthquake victims.

Feast of the Guardian Angels



KNOW THE FACTS. Domestic abuse and violence refers to a pattern of violent and coercive behavior exercised by one adult in an intimate relationship over another. It is not a private family matter.

Domestic violence, also known as intimate partner violence (IPV) is defined by the Centers for Disease Control as a serious, preventable public health problem that affects millions of Americans. It refers to the physical, sexual, or psychological harm by a current or former partner or spouse and does include teen dating relationships.

A statistic from the Bureau of Justice indicates that from 1994 to 2010, about 4 in 5 victims of intimate partner violence were female. Domestic violence affects the whole family, including any children. Faith communities are called to offer hope, help, and healing to all harmed by domestic abuse and violence.

WHAT CAN I DO TO BE HELPFUL IF AN ABUSIVE SITUATION IS REVEALED?

- Listen, Believe, and Refer. Share that the abuse is not God's will. Say that help is available 24/7 at the National Domestic Violence Hotline (1-800-799-SAFE (7233) or at www.ndvh.org.
- Let her know that without intervention, abuse often escalates in frequency and severity over time.
- Seek expert assistance by calling the NDVH. Refer her only to specialized domestic violence counseling programs, not to couples counseling.
- If possible, encourage the abusive person to seek help. Attending an appropriate 12 step recovery group has been a source of recovery for many people.
