Prayer, silence and the Blessed **Virgin Mary** Bishop Vincke reflects on

his 25 years as a priest

very day starts at around 5 a.m. No alarm, just the routine. Still in his pajamas, his first steps are to the house chapel for holy hour. Bishop Vincke's every day begins together with Jesus Christ himself, in prayer and silence, discerning God's will.

"I would say the Lord has blessed me with being at peace with silence and he's blessed me with knowing the importance of prayer," shares a refreshed looking Bishop Vincke in his chancery office on a rainy late-April Saturday just after lunch.

Bishop Vincke, who will turn 60 on July 9th, would rather not talk so much about himself but he has an important milestone coming up. His priestly ordination anniversary is June 12th, and he opened his doors to talk about the takeaways from his 25 years as a priest.

Jerry a joy that he wanted. Their secret? "They seemed detached from the world but very involved with the world in terms of prayer," says **Bishop Vincke**.

They planted a seed that would grow. It just needed time and encouragement. In his last year of high school, as he walked out of Mass with his girlfriend, his parish priest asked if he had ever considered the priesthood.

A few years later at Ferris State University in Michigan where he studied public relations, he had an assignment to get a comment from the priest in charge of the campus Newman Center. "And he just looked at me. Didn't answer the question. He just asked me, 'Have you ever thought about being a priest?' And that was the second time."

It wasn't until he was 22, though, during an internship with the St.

he wants me to do this." Several years and one last girlfriend later, he finally accepted the call and entered the seminary.

The first year of seminary was the hardest, but it was during that first month at Athenaeum Seminary in Cincinnati, Ohio, that Jerry made a pledge to pray a rosary every day for the rest of his life. "It has happened and I think Mary's the one that really got me through "Lord I'm in your hands and I'm going to give my life to you' and ... 'wow, you chose me to do this." The rest is "a bit of a blur" at this point, but "it was emotional." Lansing **Bishop Carl Mingeling** ordained him and his parents threw a party for him out on the farm later that day.



Cultivating a vocation

Bishop Vincke grew up on a dairy farm in Michigan, the ninth of ten children. His parents raised him in the Faith. He stayed close to the sacraments. His mom made sure he made it to confession every month. Their family faith tradition had deep roots. His grandfather fought in the Great War back in Poland with John Paul II's father. And, it was his father's four sisters in the Benedictine order back in his native-Louisiana that showed young

Louis Cardinals Major League Baseball team that he really felt that call to the priesthood himself. Although he didn't immediately pursue it, he ultimately couldn't ignore it. "I felt that not only did God want me to do this, but this is where I want to be," Bishop Vincke shares. One of his Benedictine aunts had given him a series of cassette tapes on St Ignatius' life that described the saint's own discernment process. "He felt the Lord say, 'Leave everything to me, I need you in this world.' And I felt the Lord saying, yeah,

this," says Bishop Vincke very sincerely.

He saw the years of formation through and on June 12, 1999, the Feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, the then-34-yearold Deacon Jerry Vincke entered the Diocese of Lansing's St Mary's Cathedral. It was the hottest day of the year in a cathedral with no air conditioning when Deacon Vincke and two other candidates for the priesthood lay prostrate before the Lord as clergy, family and friends sang the Litany of Saints.

Laying there, the soon-to-be Fr. Vincke thought,

sacraments for 25 years, a priest develops an incredible body of experience, knowledge, and wisdom. Bishop Vincke has served as parish priest, director of a youth retreat center, vocations director, formator at Rome's Pontifical North American College, and now as Bishop of Salina. All of that experience has made it clear to him what God expects of his priests.

"A priest is called to lay down his life like a Good Shepherd for his people and especially to offer the sacrifice of the Mass which

Giving the gift of an encounter with God

"Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.

Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created, and you shall renew the face of the earth."

This past Sunday, we celebrated the Feast of Pentecost in which the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples of Jesus. This changed their lives. Jesus ascended to heaven but continued his mission through the working of the Holy Spirit in the lives of

his disciples. It's good to remind ourselves that what happened then is happening now. We have received the Holy Spirit through our Baptism and

Confirmation-the same Holy Spirit as the Apostles–and not a lesser quality either. The mission of Jesus continues in us. The chapters of the Acts of the Apostles continue in our lives through the working of the Holy Spirit.

My desire as your bishop is that every person in our diocese is filled with the Holy Spirit and each one of you experiences God's love in your hearts.

Pope Francis commented on the importance of the Holy Spirit: "I would like to ask you a question: how many of you pray to the Holy Spirit every day? Probably few, but we must satisfy this desire of Jesus and pray every day to the Holy Spirit, so that he opens our heart towards Jesus. Let's ask ourselves: are we open to the Holy Spirt, do I pray to him to enlighten me, to make me more sensitive to the things of God? And this is a prayer we need to pray every day: Holy Spirit, may my heart be open to the Word of God, may my heart be open to good, may my heart be open to

the beauty of God every day." In last month's column, I

mentioned that we are called to be disciples on mission. Pope Francis began his Apostolic **Exhortation Evangelium Gaudi**um with these words: "The joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept his offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ joy is constantly born anew."

The greatest gift we can give another is the

encounter with Jesus-the Savior of the world. Again, Pope Francis asks, "Do we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit, so as to be an active part

of our communities, or do we close in on ourselves, saying 'I have so many things to do, that's not my job'?

Jesus' mission was aimed at giving the Spirit of God to all of us so we can continue his mission. May we be aware of our baptism and confirmation, sources of grace that are always present in us. May we give away what we have received. May the gift of the Holy Spirit be desired, prayed for and rediscovered today.

Saint Mother Teresa once said "I can do things you cannot. You can do things I cannot. We can do great things together." Come Holy Spirit!



It all adds up to One for Fr. Chacko

He might be a math whiz. But Father Mathew Chacko wouldn't even begin to guess how many sacraments he has performed as a Catholic priest.

Nonetheless, he will tell you that the one that ranks at the top for him is the Eucharist – the opportunity to offer Mass on a daily basis.

Fr. Mathew, in his 11th year of serving the Salina Diocese, celebrated his 40th anniversary of priesthood earlier this month.

A native of India, he came to Kansas in 2012, but it wasn't his first experience in the United States.

Fr. Mathew was ordained in his home country on May 11, 1984, and began teaching math at a university in India.

A few years later, he came to the U.S. to work on master's and doctorate degrees in math at Columbia University in New York City. He already had earned three bachelor's degrees and a master's in his home country in 12 years prior to his ordination.

After graduating from Columbia, he began teaching math at universities in New York and serving as an associate pastor at area churches there before returning to India in 2007. Because of some serious health issues with one of our diocesan priests, Salina Bishop Edward Weisenburger summoned help from the Carmelite of Mary Immaculate congregation in India, and Fr. Mathew became a Kansas citizen. He served as pastor of parishes in Wilson, Dorrance and Holyrood from 2012-19 before returning to his home country because of health issues of his own.

When Fr. Mathew came back to Kansas three years later, he was assigned pastor of parishes in three more small towns in the northwest part of the vast diocese.


Fr. Mathew describes himself as quiet, as do his parishioners, but they are quick to add they appreciate his reverence and his love of his vocation.

Carol Wessel, sacristan for the three parishes, said she is impressed with Fr. Mathew's memory.

"He has no notes when he gives a sermon," she said. "He's very on top of

everything. He is really knowledgeable, and it amazes me that he can talk like that without notes."

Fr. Mathew keeps a busy schedule. He says one Mass at all three parishes on the weekends and alternates among them for weekly Masses every day but Monday. That dedication is not lost on his parishioners. "We have three small parishes out here," Wessel said, "so we feel very fortunate to have him.

He found that life in rural western Kansas was a stark contrast to the hustle and bustle of New York City.

"It wasn't really a culture shock going to New York," said Father Mathew, who grew up in the metro area of Bangalore, a population of several million people even back then, much like New York.

is for the salvation of souls," says Bishop Vincke. "A priest is called to give his life away for his flock. He is not a priest for himself but for others."

Looking back, he sees clearly that he has been blessed in so many ways throughout his priesthood.

The first great blessing that comes to his mind is that he accompanied both of his parents in the final days and moments of their lives. His father, Henry, died the year after his priestly ordination. His mother, Fidelis, passed on to eternal life three years ago.

As director of vocations back in the Diocese of Lansing, he started with 13 men and grew the seminarian numbers to 38. "It's all God's Providence and God's calling," he learned then. "Give it to God and he takes care of everything for us. God always provides and we don't have to do all the work. God is so good to us."

Being in Rome for five years as the formator for 42 men was a "beautiful assignment" and then came the move back to pastor at a 2,000-family parish and K-8 school in Michigan. "I loved it, absolutely loved it," he says of the experience.

Being ordained a bishop in 2018 necessarily changed his priesthood. He's still getting used to not being able to "go to the bishop" himself when an issue arises. The episcopate "was never on my radar," he says of it now, but adds "it's about trusting in the Lord, that he's going to provide."

All of these important moments and roles have given him a unique perspective, but the nugget of wisdom he most goes back to is: "The more time you spend in silence, the more the Lord speaks to your heart."

He knows when he's praying well and regularly because "you go through those ups and downs in your spiritual life, and it allows you to love your people so much more."

Bishop Vincke adds that he does have some regrets. "You always want to be an instrument of God's love instead of a barrier. In the seminary, they teach you either you're going to be a bridge for the people or a barrier, and there are a few times I've been a barrier."

"My only regrets are not loving people the way that God asked me to love them," says the bishop. But, he also sees the good God brings out of those situations and has learned to trust in God's plan.

"I would say the Lord has blessed me with being at peace with silence and to pray, and he has blessed me with knowing the importance of prayer. And, I would say the other gift is I actually love being with people and at the same time I'm comfortable being alone, very comfortable with just being with the Lord."

Following the Blessed lead

Mary has marked his life deeply. The two greatest influences on his life, in fact, are "my parents and the Blessed Mother," he says. Well before his ordination, he would pray for her intercession and he felt her presence in his life.

But, it was five years after his ordination while he was in Rome visiting that he received confirmation of her guiding hand. It was the December 8 Feast of the Immaculate Conception, a nation-wide holiday in Italy and the day when the Pope visits a statue of Mary across the city center from the Vatican at the beautiful Piazza di Spagna. There, he makes a brief address to the city's residents and leads those present in prayer.

The year was 2004 and he was a guest at the Pontifical North American College, the American seminary in Rome. Unsure if he should make the trek across town or not, he dropped to his knees in his room to pray about it. He felt Mary urging him to go, so he did.

He started walking, only knowing the general direction he should go. At a stoplight, he met an English-speaking man who led him to a religious house, directed him down a road, and went on his way. At the end of the road, he found himself standing on a few stairs adjacent to the street, not knowing what would happen next.

There on the packed streets, John Paul II arrived, bent over by Parkinson's. As he was passing in front of Fr. Jerry Vincke, two little girls stopped the pope and gave him some flowers. "He was kind of like leaning over and he spins around like he's looking for someone and then all of a sudden he looks at me and he nods to me and gives me his blessing. And that was the Blessed Mother. I really believe that."

The bishop's takeaway from that experience was simple, and he has lived by it since: "Listen to the Blessed Mother's lead."

There was another time when he was struggling with prayer. "Mary simply said to my heart, 'Let's just be with Jesus.' Sometimes you go to prayer asking yourself what am I going to say or what am I going to do? And there's Mary just saying it's okay just to be together. It's like a husband and wife driving a car for an hour. Sometimes you say a little bit and sometimes you don't and that's kind of how I feel about that."

She's been there every step of the way, the bishop says. "I was ordained a deacon on the presentation of Mary, a priest on the Immaculate Heart of Mary, and then became a bishop on the Feast of the Queenship of Mary, August 22nd."

for intentions the Holy Spirit puts on his heart. He sometimes thinks of his favorite place on the planet: the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes, in France. He's been there five times.

Then, he arrives at his destination and is catapulted into action. He loves to be among the people. Not only at formal events like First Communions, Confirmations, Knights of Columbus, conferences, school auctions, seminarian dinners and USCCB meetings, but, it's family occasions as well.

He's at parishes, schools, homes. He'll ride along on combines during the harvest and help ranchers with the calving season. He's been known to drop by a Confirmation party or at sporting events across the diocese on a moment's notice. He once got a black eye playing a pick-up football game with some school kids, but still jumps into whatever game is going on when he arrives in time for recess.

When he's in Salina, he leads morning prayer daily at the chancery. The bishop and staff pray for parishioners across the diocese by name. Different people, different needs every morning. He gets on a weekly video call on Monday evenings with his family to pray a

A man on (a) mission

Bishop Vincke is known for traveling across the 27,000 square miles of the diocese continuously, always on the move. After his morning routine in Salina, after his Holy Hour, Mass, and duties at the chancery, "I go somewhere," he says. "I like to sleep in my own bed, but I don't mind being on the road."

He visited each of the 86 diocesan parishes in the past year as part of a "Year of Mercy." Since his ordination to the episcopate, he's been to each of the parishes "multiple times," in his estimation. That time in the car between places is spent praying, in silence or listening to classical music, often alone,

rosary. His brother, Dan, thanks God for their parents, "who gave us the gift of the Faith."

He loves to walk. When he has the time, he walks the trails through Salina for hours. He walks and he prays the rosary, making sure to ask for St. Maximilian Kolbe and St. John Paul II's intercession at the end. When he doesn't have the time to go for a long walk, he jumps on a stair-stepper machine. "Doctor's orders" to keep his heart healthy.

He doesn't say anything about it in this interview, but there's so much he does besides. **Relationships are everything to Bishop** Vincke.

He's known for forming real relationships with people. He doesn't often forget a name.

They know him in the jails and other ministries and apostolates, as he watches out for and watches over the vulnerable. All the

kids know him. So many of the diocese's university, high school, and elementary students have personal relationships with him.

He is known to run up the stairs of the chancery, taking them two at a time to save time. He's a man on a mission.

Parents comforted through faith, fellowship

very parent reacts differently to the loss of a child, regardless of their child's age.

Dave and Donna Ward have decided to honor the memory of their 12-year-old son, Matt-who died in an accident back in 1999 by helping others going through similar losses.

That's the message they gave those attending a memorial Mass for parents of deceased children on May 8 at Sacred Heart Church in Plainville.

Bishop Jerry Vincke said a similar Mass at St. Thomas More Church in Manhattan the day before.

tion. "I think a day like today is a beautiful example of how we can do just that."

"Just as Jesus entrusted Mary to his Church, entrust your children to Mary," Stramel continued. "Mary's life offers comfort to those who grieve. Just as Mary found strength in her faith, so, too, do grieving parents find solace in drawing closer to her son."

Following the Mass, parents were invited to gather in the Knights of Columbus Hall for refreshments. They were also invited to share their stories if they so chose.

Some spoke freely of their deceased children, who ranged in age from adults to babies who were miscarried during pregnancy. Others sat pensively quiet, unsure if they could speak without being overcome with emotion. The Wards wholeheartedly accepted the challenge to speak. "I've learned through the years that you never know when your story is going to be someone else's salvation piece," Donna said. "That's humanity. That's what we're all here for. We're all part of a club we don't wish to be part of, but we are. That's our connection, and we have to respect the fact that everyone deals with loss in their own way." The Wards told how on July 4, 1999, they were playing golf with friends in their hometown of Norton, and their son was was

playing with a neighborhood friend in his backyard. His friend shot at a bird on a clothesline pole. The BB hit the pole, ricocheted back and hit Matt in his temple.

They said Matt seemed fine until his brain began to swell. He walked into his friend's house and collapsed. He was life-watched to a hospital in Kearney, Neb., and died a few hours later.

Donna said like any tragedy, the Wards first went through the "what ifs." What if they hadn't played another nine holes of golf that day, and they would have been home. What if it hadn't been so windy, and Matt would have been at the lake. What if

"Then we realized there were so many things that had to come in line that day for that exact moment to happen," she said. "It wouldn't have mattered what we were doing. It was his time."

Donna said that as she and her family sat in the hospital chapel soon after Matt's passing, she heard a voice asking, "If I were to give you Matt for 12 years or not at all, what would you choose?"

"I know it was God's voice. It sat me down, and I had to answer," she continued. "I felt the voice needed an answer."

"I would take the 12 years," she admitted.

So on they marched – some days fine, other days difficult - for the past 25 years.

"Everyone feels pain; that's the universal thing about humanity," Donna said. "And everyone's pain is unique to them. We believe it's all about a choice of where you want to put your energy."

That energy for the Wards is in

their family. They eventually moved from Norton to the beautiful mountains of Colorado. But when their daughter, Tara, and her family moved to Hays, the Wards soon followed.

"I love the mountains," Dave said. "But our family is here, and family is the most important. This is where we want to be."

They have also put their energy into being involved with youth, especially in coaching (Dave in wrestling and Donna, volleyball).

The Wards say that sports parallel real life in so many ways, and "we have been blessed by the opportunity to teach life lessons through coaching, ones that athletes can take into adulthood."

Dave remembers talking to his son after a baseball game when Matt was disappointed about not having a better performance.

Dave asked Matt if he had done his best, and that's what he needed to continue to strive for. After Matt died, the Wards adopted "Just Do Your Best" (JDYB) as Matt's motto, which they continue use with their youth athletes today.

Donna talked about how you never know how your faith will be tested and that she realized "the greatest gift our parents gave us was the foundation of faith."

The Wards say they "keep going" with the belief they will indeed see Matt again someday.

"I learned about the foundation of what I needed to know - that belief in eternity," she said. "If I live to be 100, it's going to be a snap of a finger compared to eternity."

The Wards, who live in Hays, had not heard of these Masses for parents before this year. When they learned one would be so close to home, they decided to attend.

The diocese intentionally offers these Masses sometime during May – the month of Mary, Jesus' mother.

During each Mass, parents are given a rose to present to Mother Mary in a large vase at the front of church as Bishop Vincke greets each parent approaching the statue.

"During the month of May, we as Catholics are called to renew our faith and trust in Mary," Clare Stramel from the diocesan Office of Respect Life told the congrega-

There is a changing of the guard for the annual Auction for Christian Education at Thomas More Prep-Marian Junior-Senior High School in Hays.

Led by 32-year-old Mason Ruder – advancement director for Hays Catholic Schools – and his crew, the 2024 ACE, to which it's commonly referred, went off without a hitch the last weekend of April in its attempt to break last year's record of \$897,700.

The Walter and Marie Dechant family kicked off Item 160 this year with a donation of \$102,500. The Leo J. and Albina Dreiling Trust contributed a dollarfor-dollar matching fund for up to \$250,000, so that item alone had reached nearly \$500,000 before the auction even began.

Although a younger crowd is helping take over the event's planning, Ruder and his employees still had plenty of help this year from the old guard.

Mary Lang and Kathy Kaseforth, who each had worked more than 25 years in TMP-M's alumni office before recently retiring, helped out this year.

Wanda Billinger, long-time director of the school's alumni association, has worked on ACE for more than 35 years and has been looking forward to – and preparing for – the 50th ACE for several years. She personally solicits hundreds of gifts for ACE each year.

Ruder acknowledged that his office couldn't have gotten the job done without Billinger's lead and the help of so many other volunteers.

"With our new crew, we are only as successful as we are because of all the work and foundation of those that went before us," Ruder said. "To be able to carry on from what we learned from the generation that has taken care of us for so long is a privilege."

Even the crowd has taken on a younger look in recent years. Several alumni were walking the halls of TMP-M as students just six years ago.

One of those was Ethan Lang, a 2018 graduate who attended his first ACE with his wife, Emily, also a TMP-M alum ('19).

"It was really cool to be able to experience ACE from a different view," he said, adding that he was glad to see several people who he attended school with at the auction.

"It's great to see the different generations where one of the main things you all have in common is TMP, everyone caring about the future of TMP," he said.

From tragedy to healing: A mother's journey with Catholic Charities

Tynan Dowell's life changed forever with a tragic drowning accident that no mother should ever have to endure.

"Clara was a chubby little girl with bright blonde hair and bright blue eyes, just like her daddy," she shares.

As Tynan recalls her 14-monthold daughter Clara's vibrant personality and the joy she brought to their family, she also recounts the harrowing experience of the accident and the subsequent loss. The support of her husband and the guidance of Bishop Vincke helped her navigate the initial stages of grief, but the journey towards healing required a different kind of support-one that Catholic Charities provided.

Tynan connected with Jessica Sampson, Director of Family Support Services and a therapist at Catholic Charities in Manhat-



tan. Their first phone call marked the beginning of a therapeutic journey that would lead Tynan towards healing and growth.

"When I stepped into the offices of Catholic Charities, I felt very warm. I felt very welcomed. I felt very secure in being able to share my trauma, being able to share how I had been grieving," Tynan reflects.

One aspect that stood out to

jrtesy Photo Tynan was the emphasis on setting goals during her counseling sessions. "Setting those goals was one thing that was very helpful. I felt like in the season of grieving, it's very easy just to be stagnant and just to kind of sit in it. She always encouraged me to set goals," Tynan explains. "We were able to talk through what I specifically needed to work on, and what I could take home and



work on together as a family as we were healing."

Reflecting on her counseling experience, Tynan emphasizes the importance of seeking professional help in times of trauma and loss. She shares, "Everybody is going to have a cross to carry at some point in their life, and **Catholic Charities provides** opportunities for people to grow, to heal, to process, to learn, to set goals so that they can get through the trauma or the struggles or the cross that they have to carry."


FR. ZIMMERMAN TO CELEBRATE GOLDEN JUBILEE

It was just my mom and me throughout my childhood, as my parents separated when I was younger. Facing my father's absence, I found peace and strength in my faith. Since my father wasn't in the picture, I recognized early on that Jesus would fill the role as my father figure and the dependable presence I would rely on while growing up. The initial confusion and sadness about my parents' relationship led me to a realization-I discovered that God's love is the anchor I need. This realization has empowered me to cultivate resilience and strength, traits my younger self would have done anything for. I am reminded of Jesus' constant love for me and others daily. I'm grateful for the challenging lessons that shaped me into who I am today; without them my love for Jesus wouldn't be the same.

My parish is a church that I believe everyone should have the opportunity to attend. It stands on a solid foundation, and every Sunday, my connection with God deepens during Mass. The anticipation of receiving the sacrament of initiation has been a long-held aspiration of mine. 

The initial review, conducted in 2022, found that U.S. dioceses together averaged 67 out of a possible 100 points when measured against the accepted standards. With a score of 91.5% the Salina Diocese ranks in the top tier, amongst 168 other dioceses.



Fr. Joseph Asirvatham says goodbye

From seeing his first snowfall

and adjusting to the ways Americans worship at Mass, to learning the nuances of American culture, Father Joseph Asirvatham's experiences over the last decade have been vast. Now, as

he prepares to say goodbye to the people of the Salina Diocese, Father Joseph will take his memories of Kansas home to the people of southern India and his next assignment.

Father Joseph was ordained in Tamilnadu, India, on February 3, 2009. In 2014, he arrived in Kansas during a snowstorm, ready to serve the people of the Salina Diocese.

Father Joseph then

Church as an associate pastor. "Father Kevin [Weber] taught

me so much while I was in Hays," Father Joseph recalled. "I had culture shock from the punctuality of people who came to church, the food – it was a struggle initially to eat American food because it was so different, and even obtaining my driver's license ... I learned a lot!

"When I came to the U.S. and Immaculate Heart of Mary, I started with a charismatic way of preaching, but that just wasn't what people were used to," he added, saying he learned to adjust to a more reserved style of worship.

Father Joseph said one element of life in central and western Kansas that he has deeply appreciated has been the hospitality of the people.

"The people are so constant in helping," he said. "The parishioners have encouraged me a lot and I've shared a lot about Indian culture with them."

Those parishioners span several communities across the Diocese. During his time in Kansas, Father Joseph has served parishes in Hays, Beardsley, Bird City, Cawker City, Downs, Goodland, Osborne, St. Francis, Sharon Springs and Tipton.

"I'm so thankful to all the priests he strives for wherever he goes.

and parishioners here who took care of me, and also to our bishops for inviting us and allowing us to be part of this family to serve the faithful," Father Joseph said. "I am grateful, happy and thankful for them."

While he will complete his current assignment as Parish Administrator in St. Francis, Bird City and Beardsley at the end of June and stay in Kansas through early July, Father Joseph is excited about reuniting with his family and jumping into whatever assignment his bishop has ready for him upon his return to India. Bitter defeat, solid wins, mark 2024 Kansas Legislative Session

An insidious assault on children by the tragically misguided "gender transition" industry was this close to being shut down by the 2024 Kansas Legislature. Two last minute "flip flop" votes, including one by a State Representative from Beloit, resulted in a bitter defeat.

Emotionally vulnerable Kansas children struggling with their sexuality are the big losers.

For reasons unknown nor seriously explored by much of academia, the incidence of gender dysphoria (GD) in Kansas and around the world is exploding. GD is a psychological condition in which children express strong desires or feelings to be treated as the gender other than their biological sex. Some children describe feeling as if they were "born in the wrong body."

For much of the past two decades, so-called "transition treatments" for GD included puberty blockers, cross-sex hormone injections, and even the surgical amputation of healthy genitals and breasts. The secular news media insists on misnaming all this as "gender-affirming care."

Now these "treatments" are coming under severe peer-reviewed criticism as medically misleading and even experimental. Many children-victims who've suffered debilitating, life-changing harm are seeking to "de-transition." Lawsuits are being filed against the medical community for the physical harm they've caused.

Today, policy makers from European countries where gender transition procedures began are sounding the alarm, reversing course, and taking the responsible step of banning these procedures. Twenty-two American states have done the same. Kansas Legislators passed the Help Not Harm Act, S.B. 233, ensuring that minors could not receive puberty blockers, cross sex hormones or surgery to treat

them. Help Not Harm passed with veto-proof margins.

As expected, Governor Kelly vetoed the legislation. Then unexpectedly, two State Representatives, including Rep. Susan Concannon (R-Beloit), flip-flopped their original vote and sustained the veto, extinguishing a golden opportunity to protect Kansas children.

Sadly, instead of treating confused and questioning children with compassion and understanding, Kansas will continue to allow these harmful procedures to continue.

The lost override vote on Help Not Harm was a major blemish on an otherwise positive legislative session from the perspective of the Kansas Catholic Conference and the Catholic Bishops of Kansas.

We were encouraged by legislative overrides on other vetoes to pass Pro-Life laws designed to help women in unplanned pregnancies, encourage adoption and support pregnancy resource centers. Lives will be saved as a result.

BY PATRICIA MACDONALD In the winter of 1873, a lone Jesuit missionary left St. Xavier's in Junction City, KS and crossed the cold wind-swept prairie to visit the new com-

munity of Hope. Riders were sent to notify Catholic families a priest, Fr. Phillip Scholl, had arrived to say Mass. Fr. Scholl continued to visit the settlers monthly, saying Mass in various homes. In 1877, construction of a simple 24 x 30 frame church was completed on land donated by A. Henquenet. It was named for St. Phillip the Apostle and to honor the young priest the people loved and admired. The congregation hosted visiting priests from Junction City, Solomon, Abilene, Council Grove and

Herington. In 1907-08, a group of Polish families arrived from Nebraska, increasing the number of parishioners. A larger church was needed. Construction started in 1909 on land donated by James Haley (Healy) under the direction of Father J. B. Glynn. Parish member Francis L "Frank" Steffek was the building contractor. The new church was dedicated May 10, 1910, by Bishop John F. Cunningham of Concordia. Two small statues of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Blessed Virgin Mary, which adorned the first church, now grace the high altar where descendants of the early settlers worship today.

St. Phillip's remained a mission church until 1946 when it became a separate parish. In 1960, the house north of the church was donated by the heirs of the former owner Miss Elizabeth Lorson, fulfilling her wish to make her home a rectory for a parish priest. Fr. Basil Torrez was assigned as St. Phillip's first resident priest, allowing the congregation to enjoy daily Mass and two services on Sunday.

1983 saw the last resident priest leave. St. Phillip's once again shares a pastor, Father George Chalbhagam, with Herington and Elmo. A parish anniversary celebration

is planned for Sunday, July 7, 2024. Bishop Jerry Vincke will celebrate Mass at 4:30 p.m., followed by a catered meal and program on church history in the parish hall.
