Making it work

Fr. Mark Wesely hosts Totus Tuus the same week at 2 parishes.

Pivot might have become one of the new buzz words during the COVID-19 pandemic.

But Father Mark Wesely and many priests like him have been adapting, changing, improvising – making things work – for years.

Father Mark became a pro at pivoting during this year's Totus Tuus sessions in two of his three parishes in central Kansas.

Because of a change in schedules, St. Patrick Parish in Lincoln and Immaculate Conception Parish in Minneapolis were scheduled for the same week for the 2024 summer Catholic youth program.

Those two parishes are in different counties and separated by 30 miles.

In order to say daily Mass for both programs, Fr. Mark drove the 60-mile trip back and forth each day while tending to his other duties for both those parishes as well as St. Mary Parish in Glasco.

Bill Meagher, director of youth ministry for the Salina Diocese, said the schedule overlap happened when Lincoln agreed to a last-minute trade for the first week's time slot when another parish had a scheduling conflict. Nearly 25 parishes in the diocese hosted Totus Tuus programs this year.

"Even knowing that would make for

Kansas Supreme Court weighs in on abortion

Pro-life Kansans felt a painstaking loss on July 5 when the KS Supreme Court issued opinions overturning two laws on limiting access to abortion.

One of the laws placed restrictions on clinics and doctors who perform abortions.

The second law, Senate Bill 95, banned second trimester abortions, including abortions through a method known as "dismemberment abortions."

Neither law had been in effect—both had been shut down by lower courts previously—but the case was brought to the Kansas Supreme Court with hopes from pro-life advocates that those lower court decisions would be reversed.

The State said three interests compelled the creation of S.B. 95: "(1) promoting respect for the value of, and the

dignity of, human life, born or unborn; (2) protecting the interests of innocent third parties; and (3) regulation and protection of the medical profession and the medical care provided to Kansans."

The court disagreed.

Justice Eric Rosen, on behalf of the majority wrote, "We stand by our conclusion that section 1 of the Kansas Constitution Bill of Rights protects a fundamental right to personal autonomy, which includes a pregnant person's right to terminate a pregnancy."

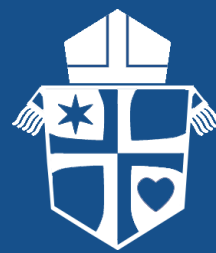
Although this ruling did not affect any current laws, this decision may affect future rulings on abortions in Kansas.

The Catholic Church rejects abortion at any stage in an unborn child's life. The faithful are called to pray for an end to abortion and take steps to help people in need, particularly those facing crisis pregnancies.

A welcome break for 6 deacon candidates

Six members of the Salina Diocese preparing for their 2025 ordination as permanent deacons found the perfect way to take a break from their intense study this past year.

The deacon candidates have met for a full weekend of instruction every month for the past four years at the Capuchin Center for Spiritual Life, located in the St. Fidelis Friary in Victoria.

One weekend last year, Deacon Steve Frueh, director of deacons for the diocese, suggested the candidates come up with a service project.

The half dozen candidates didn't have far to look.

Since last fall, the six men have been improving outdoor seating areas around the friary.

Like their formation diaconate program, the candidates' service project didn't happen overnight.

Each weekend, which runs from Friday evening through Sunday noon, is comprised of 12 hours of instruction, prayer and fellowship. And there isn't a lot of free time on those weekends for the candidates.

Nonetheless, they made time for their project.

First, they disassembled nine old benches with rotting wood and took measurements for new wood.

Tim Donohoue, a member of Seven Dolores Parish in Manhattan, took home the iron supports for the benches to sandblast and powder coat them.

During the winter months, the candidates cut and sanded the wood in a workshop in the basement of the friary.

By spring, they were able to reassemble the frames, attach and stain the new wood pieces.

A parish member of the Basilica of St. Fidelis re-landscaped the area with fresh bark, and voilà – the seating area in the circle drive just outside the Center for Spiritual Life as well as near a statue of St.

Francis south of the building had new life.

"We were able to get in a little bit of physical labor and see the immediate effects of what we were doing," Donohoue said. "All of us get along really well, and we all have our niches. When it was showtime, people found their area and we all worked together."

Dave DiNuzzo, from St. John the Baptist Parish in Beloit, said he and the other deacon candidates were glad to get in some physical work while showing their gratitude at the same time.

"It was a lot of fun, actually," DiNuzzo said. "The Capuchins are very gracious with their space, letting us come in and sleep and eat and study, so it was the least we could do to beautify their outdoor seating areas."

The historical brick building – more than 125 years old and the first location for St. Francis Seminary – is now home to seven Capuchin priests as well as the Center for Spiritual Life.

Father Earl Befort, an Ellis County native, is one of the current friary residents in the building where he attended high school, which served as St. Francis Seminary until a new seminary building was completed in the early 1960s.

Father Earl is glad the friary can still be so useful – it has more than 50 private rooms and is used by a variety of groups as a retreat center. And he appreciates the work the deacon candidates did to improve the areas.

Ditto for Father Curtis Carlson, local guardian of the friary.

"We definitely appreciate this," Father Curtis said. "It's just beautiful what they have done, provided such a pleasant outdoor area for anyone at the center for a retreat, as well as the residents."

BISHOPS DISCUSS TEACHING, MINISTRY

Last month, the Bishops of the United States met to discuss problems, approve new programs and frameworks, and receive updates on ongoing projects throughout the nation and church.

The meetings began with addresses from Cardinal Pierre and Archbishop Broglio, followed by updates on a number of topics, including the ongoing Synod on Synodality, the National Eucharistic Revival, and more. The Bishops sent a message to Pope Francis, asking for his prayers for these meetings, as well as for the success of the Eucharistic revival in reigniting the devotion of the faithful.

A major emphasis of these meetings was the state of catechesis and the role of the catechist, or instructor in the faith. This took a number of forms, from the approval of the cause for beatification and canonization of Adele Briese, a lay catechist from Wisconsin, to formal discussions and the development of documents on the institution of catechists, how they are to be trained, and more.

The Bishops also voted to approve two sets of guidelines focused on specific areas of catechesis and ministry. The first, Listen, Teach, Send, is a proposal for how best to revitalize ministry to youth and young adults in a variety of circumstances. The bishops also approved a document, Keeping Christ's Promise, which lays out a framework for ministry to indigenous communities, emphasizing healing, recognition of past failures in ministering to these communities, and first steps toward a renewed relationship with our indigenous brothers and sisters.

Another theme of the meetings was the ongoing work of approving texts for the forthcoming new translation of the Liturgy of The Hours. The Bishops voted to approve three sets of texts for the new translation, which the International Commission for English in the Liturgy (ICEL) hopes to have prepared to print sometime in 2025. The texts approved at this meeting were largely supplementary to the books themselves, so good progress is being made.

For the average layperson, there are a few key take-aways: First, the bishops recognize a need for reform in our catechetical structures, our formation of catechists, and the way we pass down the faith. We should all consider how we are called to share the faith, and with whom. We should also take hope in and pray for the advancement of Adele Briese's cause for canonization, as she shows lay catechists a path to holiness. Finally, as the process of approving a new set of liturgical texts finally draws to a close, we ought to pray for our bishops who take such care in handing down the faith to all of us, that their mission would succeed, and we would all be brought closer to God.

Saying 'Fiat' this NFP Awareness Week, July 21-27

Have you noticed there seems to be a designated day, week or month of awareness for a multitude of causes, so much so that many times they overlap one another? Amongst all the designations, July 21-27, 2024, has been set aside by the USCCB as National Natural Family Planning (NFP) Awareness Week. Each year this week intentionally includes the anniversary of Pope St. Paul VI's encyclical *Humanae Vitae* on July 25 and the feast day of Saints Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus, on July 26.

Saints Joachim and Anne raised Mary with an openness to God's will in her life. We see this in her fiat and in the many times Mary didn't fully understand but surrendered her will to the will of the Father. Many times, the scriptures tell us Mary kept those things she didn't fully understand in her heart, pondering them. Couples utilizing NFP are called to discern together and with God, His plan for their marriage and family. They are to work cooperatively with God, who has allowed them to be co-creators with Him, as they plan their family in accord with His design for marital love which is to be unitive and procreative. Just as the Blessed Mother, oftentimes married couples don't fully understand the will of the Father but are called to ponder His plan and surrender their will to His.

July 25, 1968, Pope Paul VI released the encyclical *Humanae Vitae* (Of Human Life). This document was released after much study on the issue of birth control. While the Church had always taught contraception was against God's design for marriage, with new scientific advances and cultural changes there was pressure to reconsider the teachings. Through what has been coined as the Birth Control Commission, lay people, theologians, clergy and scientists

studied the issue and offered guidance to the Holy Father. The conclusions from the commission were certainly divided, but in what we now know to be saintly wisdom, Pope St. Paul VI concluded changing God's design for married love is not ours to change and use of contraception was not in the best interest of women, couples, families or society.

Pope Paul VI didn't only affirm Church teaching against contraception, he also called upon men of science to develop more reliable methods of NFP so couples could achieve or avoid pregnancy with more confidence and reliability. While it has evolved over time, now one could say NFP is an umbrella term for various methods of monitoring fertility naturally without the use of chemicals or devices and using that knowledge of daily fertility and infertility to achieve or avoid pregnancy. Medical advances and discoveries, particularly through the Creighton Model FertilityCare System, have also led to the development of NaProTechnology, a women's health care science that allows physicians to evaluate, diagnose and treat many reproductive and gynecological health issues women and couples experience. In other words, trusting in God's design for fertility and the marital embrace, couples using NFP can work with Him cooperatively to learn about how their bodies work, plan their families, and take care of their physical health.

Not too long ago Bishop Vincke sent me an article from Catholic News Agency entitled "Why do so many Catholics use birth control?" The article suggested challenges of the culture and poor Catechesis were key factors in a majority of Catholics disregarding Church teaching and choosing to use contraception.

National NFP Awareness Week is a great time to share the good news of the Church teaching related to marriage and family life, including a respect for the gift of fertility. The USCCB has many articles, videos and

other resources for anyone interested in learning more about Natural Family Planning, *Humanae Vitae* and other related teachings (<https://www.usccb.org/topics/natural-family-planning>). Our diocesan Natural Family Planning Office also has a variety of resources on our website (<https://salinadiocese.org/office/natural-family-planning/>).

As the diocesan NFP Coordinator I have prayed about my role and the role of this office in addressing the issues mentioned in the CNA article from Bishop Vincke. Hopefully this article has piqued your interest to learn more about the Church teaching on NFP and to research the many benefits of NFP. It is my plan to include more information about these topics in future issues of *The Register*. In the meantime, I ask you to consider reading *Humanae Vitae* and discuss it with your spouse, fiancé, friend group, pastor, etc. and let it guide your life. Surrender can be hard and surrendering something as personal and intimate as your fertility can be especially hard. We can follow the example of the Blessed Mother who gave her fiat many times over, because God can never be outdone in generosity.

This conference serves to recognize and celebrate excellence in journalism, communications and media all over the country. Several members of the Communications team earned awards for their efforts in the Salina Diocese.

Communications Coordinator Matea Gregg won first place from the CMA for Social Media Professional of the Year. Gregg is the diocesan content manager for social platforms, photographer, videographer, and assistant editor for faith magazine and The Register.

faith magazine editor Katie Hamel won several awards for her contributions to diocesan publications. She earned first place for "Best reporting on the celebration of a sacrament" for her story, "Crossroads: A son's journey home." This story was featured in the January 2023 issue of faith, which focused on the beauty of the sacrament of reconciliation.

Hamel also won the category of Best Interview for her story "Remembering Cecilia," featured in the May 2023 issue of faith. The story focused on a grieving mother turning to Mary in her time of sorrow.

"Lacy (Cecilia's mom) was so open and raw in

sharing her experience," Hamel said. "I was deeply moved and inspired by her strength to go on. But the thing that most struck my heart was when Lacy talked about forgiving the driver who had accidentally taken Cecilia's life. She had a mother's heart of forgiveness just like Mary. She looked at the young woman with pity and mercy and forgave her."

Gregg and Hamel jointly earned second place in Best Video-Feature for their "I Said 'Yes'" seminarian video. The nominating committee said the video stood out as a "first-person celebration of the Church's future, offering a unique approach to storytelling."

Additionally, freelance writer Diane Gasper-O'Brien received recognition for her stellar work for The Register. Under Hamel's guidance as editor, Gasper-O'Brien earned second place for the category of Best News Writing on Regional Events.

She also earned Honorable Mention for the category of Best Reporting on a Senior Citizen for her story "Stitch in Time." The story featured 95-year-old Aurelia Pacey of Manhattan, who sews and donates dresses for young girls in need around the world.

Gasper-O'Brien,

who was raised in Tipton and lives in Hays, has spent a lifetime working for FHSU and The Hays Daily News. She covers events all over the diocese, primarily focusing on diocesan schools and youth.

"I have often said that storytelling is part of my DNA," Gasper-O'Brien said. "Those close to me say I was born talking and that I haven't stopped since! I recognize and respect that our talents are gifts from God, and in writing stories, I am blessed to get the chance to use that particular talent in a positive way."

WHAT STORIES HAVE BEEN THE MOST IMPACTFUL FOR YOU?

Diane Gasper-O'Brien:

The stories that have impacted me the most while writing for the diocese are probably the Memorial Masses for Parents of Deceased Children since one of our sons is deceased. I feel I can empathize with those parents, and it is refreshing to hear stories of how parents honor their children in some manner while keeping their memories alive.



Katie Greenwood:

The most impactful story for me was the one I wrote on little Cecilia Graf. I remember the day Cecilia died. Everyone at the Chancery was somber that day. I'm sure we were all imagining the grief of the family. For me, Cecilia was around my little brother Lewis' age. I thought about Lewis and what it would be like to lose him, and I cried for the Graf family and the little child they had lost. Fast-forward three years, and now I'm writing a story. Only now, I'm a mom. I remember working on the story, but this time it was my son who I imagined losing. And the grief I felt at even the thought of losing him was overwhelming ... writing that story was a profound and reflective experience for me, and I am honored that the Grafts trusted me to share it.



Matea Gregg:

I would say our seminarian dinner video from last year and the Call to Share videos I've been really proud of and I think they've been really impactful. I get to help spread the message of what we do as a diocese and make sure people can see our seminarians and support them. I think we've been a lot better at getting out and being present at events so we can share physical art and capture moments while people are there.

some scheduling issues, they were gracious enough to do that," Meagher said. "They really did us a favor."

No problem. Fr. Mark just made it work.

"We just had to figure out the schedule," he said. "The only thing—I wasn't able to be there for all of the activities at both sites. But we made it work."

That diligence didn't go unnoticed.

"We are so grateful that he's making it work," said Laken Rudolph, the lead Totus Tuus teacher at the Minneapolis site.

"It meant a lot to have Mass said every day," added Gabe Friess, the lead teacher in Lincoln.

Parents also appreciated the efforts of all involved to provide their children with a summer Catholic education program.

"This program is amazing," said Cheryl Hitchings, who was helping serve lunch one day in Minneapolis.

Hitchings had a prime perspective from which to make that statement.

Four of her 15 children (ages 5 to 9) participated in the Totus Tuus program during the day, and four others (ages 13 to 18) attended the evening sessions for high school students.

Hitchings and her husband

moved their large family from Missouri to Tescott about a year ago.

Tescott is about the same distance between Minneapolis and Lincoln. And she said this is the first time they had been close enough to a summer program in which to enroll her children.

Hitchings was especially impressed with how Fr.

Mark interacted with all the children, especially the youngest ones.

"Oh, I really like the little ones. Their level is my level now, too," he said with a laugh.

Fr. Mark appeared to be in his element one afternoon in the Immaculate Conception church.

The children were all ears as he explained the significance of Eucharistic Adoration.

"Spending a little time with Jesus is a sign that we recognize that He is truly with us," Father Mark explained. "Whenever you come in to see Jesus, He is so pleased you are here."

Some nodded and a couple even smiled when Fr. Mark told them that sometimes the simplest prayers are the best.

"Just say, 'Thank you, Jesus,'" he said. "That's a beautiful prayer."

At that moment, some parents in attendance were probably thinking, "Thank YOU, Fr. Mark."

Begnol, like a lot of active high school students, continues a busy schedule into the summer. And she was grateful for a break from the norm.

"It's nice, for one week, not being bombarded with so many other things to do but scrape and paint with a lot of nice people," she said.

It's not all work for the students, who also spend time in prayer and fellowship and evening activities throughout the week.

And it doesn't hurt when you're being treated well by the homeowners.

Gamblin was so appreciative of the work being done on her home that she treated the workers with ice cream sandwiches and popsicles on the warm afternoons.

To top it off, Gamblin got to participate in prayer with the youngsters when they came in the morning and also in the afternoon.

Aubrey Kaiser from Salina, a recent graduate of Kansas State University, said she was enjoying her first job as one of the college teams.

A secondary English education major, Kaiser will student teach at Riley County High School this fall, and she obviously enjoys working with teens.

Kaiser had participated in similar projects in Georgia and Florida, but this was her first P&A in her home diocese.

"It's not as humid (in Kansas) as it is down there," she said with a laugh. "And I also like these small groups. You get to know who you are working with – and the homeowners, too."

The same holds true for the homeowners. Gamblin said she will never forget them.

"I just couldn't have asked for anything better," she said. "I am so grateful."

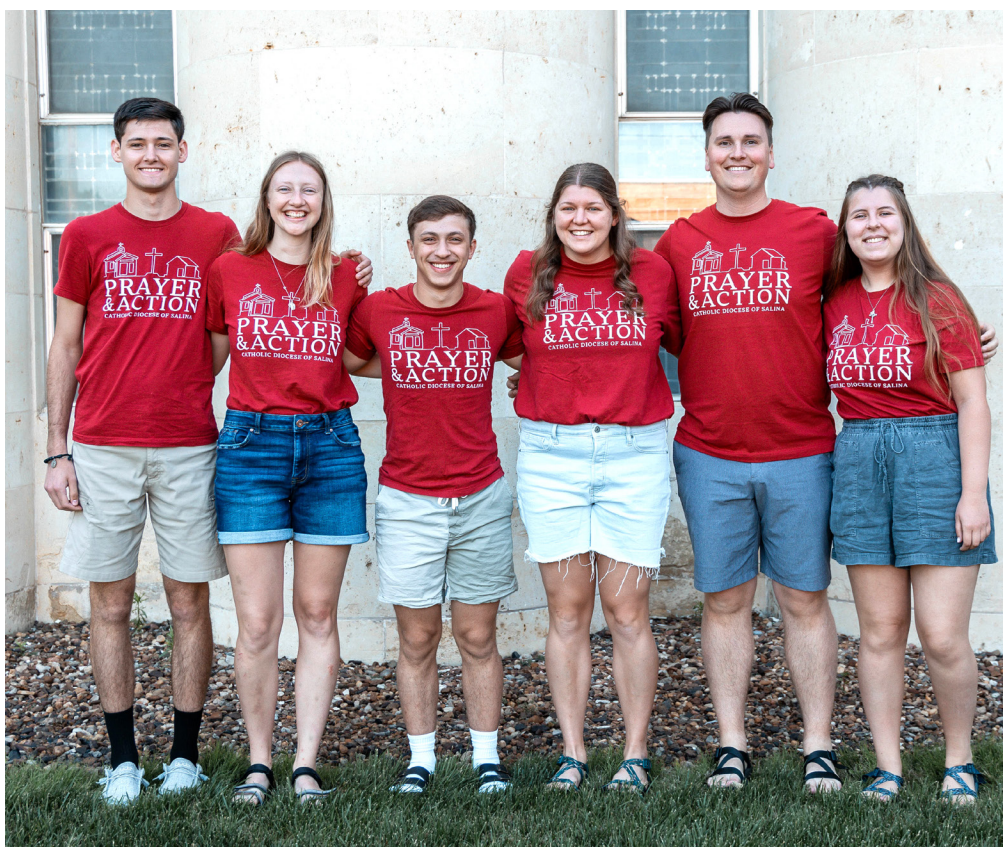

On Mission: Jamie Kuhlman joins Office of Youth Ministry

Jamie Kuhlman didn't know when she went to Prayer and Action as a freshman in high school in 2017 that she would return for the next seven years, spending a total of 25 weeks on mission, and that it would eventually become a calling and a career for her.

A recent graduate of Kansas State University, Kuhlman joins the Office of Youth Ministry after spending the summer on mission, being a team lead for Prayer and Action for her second year in a row. Her work for the diocese will include helping Bill Meagher plan youth and young adult events—including Prayer and Action—and leading the youth in our diocese closer to Christ.

Like many of the young adults

That often looked like painting a house or cleaning up an overgrown yard for people who couldn't do it themselves. "I hate scraping paint, but it's so rewarding because you spend time suffering alongside your crew, offering it up for the good of the homeowner," Kuhlman said.

She said the encounters they have with the homeowners are impactful.

"I met a woman who immediately cried on my shoulder because she said this was the hardest time in her life," Kuhlman said.

The team also gets to help the students who come each week to live on mission, living out spiritual works of mercy by instruct-

ing students in the faith.

"I just like that they are all the same age and have people to bond with and figure out their faith with together," Kuhlman said.

The Prayer and Action team members gave talks each night on how to live holy and joy-filled Catholic lives, and Kuhlman said she is excited to work more with the youth in the Salina Diocese.

"I'm looking forward to creating more opportunities for the youth like this," Kuhlman said. "To see it grow. To help them be in communion with each other."

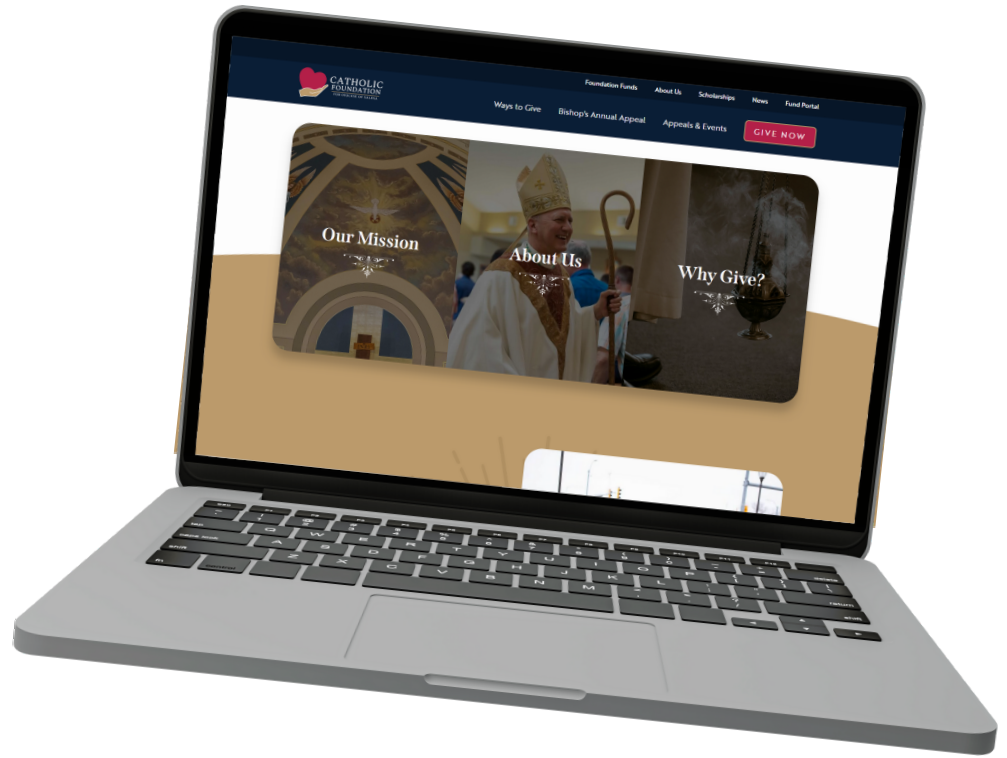

Growing their family with help from Catholic Charities

Trina and Michael Shockey's journey is one of resilience, hope, and the transformative power of adoption. When their son, Carter, arrived prematurely at 33 weeks, it marked the beginning of a challenging yet ultimately heart-warming path for their family. Trina's subsequent diagnosis of anti-phospholipid syndrome complicated their dreams of expanding their family naturally, leading them to face the difficult reality that traditional methods might not be possible.

Trina candidly shares, "I was just really grateful that Carter was okay and we were okay. But we'd planned on two or three. It was hard to kind of think, 'okay, well my body can't sustain this to grow our family.' It was a hard thing to hear for us."

However, hope was not lost. The Shockeys turned their attention to adoption, embarking on a journey filled with anticipation, challenges, and ultimately, immense joy.

Their search led them to Catholic Charities, where they discovered not only an affordable pathway to adoptive parenthood but also a compassionate community dedicated to supporting families like theirs.

After several years of waiting, the pivotal moment arrived when they received the life-changing call from adoption specialist Peggy Crippen, announcing their selection by a birth mother. Two weeks of intense preparation followed, culminating in the joyous arrival of their son, Oscar. His presence in their lives symbolizes

not just a new chapter but a testament to unwavering love and determination.

"We actually brought Oscar home on Carter's birthday," they share. "They were born one day apart. So it's very much a God thing."

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Pope approves canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis

Pope Francis gathered with the College of Cardinals on July 1 at the Vatican to review the causes of canonization for several Blesseds. The group approved 15 people for canonization, including Carlo Acutis, who is now set to be the first millennial to be named a saint.

Most of the Blesseds who were approved on July 1 will be formally added to the List of Saints on Oct. 20, 2024. A date for Acutis has not yet been set.

Born in 1991, Acutis is best known as a young Italian web designer who had a great love for the Eucharist. When he was a teenager he was diagnosed with leukemia, and he died in 2006 at the age of 15.

Despite his young death, Acutis accomplished much with his life. His fascination with computer programming led him to create an online exhibition of Eucharistic miracles, which he believed would lead many to realize Christ's presence in the Eucharist.

Acutis also led the people around him, particularly his family, closer to Christ. His mother, who had only

ever gone to Mass for her first communion, confirmation and wedding, was drawn to deep conversion by her son's witness to the faith.

He shared his love for the Eucharist and lived out his faith among his peers, too. Acutis loved playing video games and would talk to his gaming pals about the faith. A saint of our times, he played Xbox, Nintendo Game Boy and Game Cube, and he liked Spiderman and Pokémon.

Earlier this year in May, Pope Francis approved a second miracle attributed to Acutis. A young Italian woman had fallen off a bicycle and suffered severe head trauma, with what doctors said was a low chance of survival. A few days after the accident, her mother decided to go to Acutis's tomb and pray for his intercession. The same day she left, her daughter started making rapid progress back towards recovery.

The first miracle attributed to Acutis was approved in 2020, in which a young Brazilian boy was healed from a rare disease of the pancreas after venerating a relic of Acutis during the feast of Our Lady of Aparecida in 2013.

† Sr. Marie-Léonie Paradis. She was a Canadian-born religious who founded the Little Sisters of the Holy Family in the early 20th century.
