

Sacred Heart Cathedral in Salina overflowed with faithful members of the diocese excited to celebrate the annual Chrism Mass on April 10. Bishop Gerald Vincke presided over the liturgy and blessed

the sacred oils, which will be used in sacraments throughout the year all around the diocese.

During the Mass,
Bishop Vincke
blessed three sacred
oils – the Oil of the
Sick, the Oil of
Catechumens, and the Sacred
Chrism.

Each oil plays a unique role in the life of the Church. The Oil of the Sick is used to anoint those suffering illness or injury, offering comfort and healing. The Oil of Catechumens is used to strengthen those preparing for baptism. The

Sacred Chrism is used in baptisms,

confirmations, ordinations and the

dedication of churches and altars. In the year prior, the oils were used in three ordinations, three altar and church dedications, over 300 anointings, 634 confirmations and 1054 baptisms.

The Chrism Mass also offers a moment for priests to renew their vows of service. Addressing both clergy and laity, Bishop Vincke reflected on the deeper meaning of anointing.

"Christ' means 'the anointed one," he said. "And remember this: you're anointed too. We're all anointed. We've been baptized. We've been confirmed. The life of

Jesus desires to live in us."

Quoting Pope Francis, Bishop Vincke spoke about the oil used at priests' ordinations, saying the anointing

"flows over their
garments and out
into the world,"
symbolizing how
priests are called to

bring Christ's presence to those they serve.

Christ's mission and call to service was also evident in the first reading at the Mass, from 6 Isaiah, which read, "the LORD has anointed me; He has sent me to bring good news to the afflicted ..."

That call to serve — and to bring hope to those in need — is especially meaningful in this Jubilee Year of Hope. The Chrism Mass, Bishop Vincke noted, stands as a sign of that very hope, made visible through the sacraments.


Among the many priests gathered around the altar stood Fr. Ryan McCandless, who later shared with The Register what the sacred oils mean to him as a pastor.

# Love's second name

I don't think I will ever forget his reaction. I was a freshman in college on my way to confession during the Lenten season. On my way out the door, I encountered Bob, a man in his thirties who served many years in the military and

**GERALD** was known as <u>Vincke</u> one who "never missed a party."

As we talked, Bob decided to go with me to confession at the campus center.

After confession, he told me that he had never experienced so much peace in his life. It had been more than 20 years since he had last gone to confession.

What he had experienced that day was mercy. And mercy changes everything.

As we approach Divine Mercy Sunday (April 26–27) during this Jubilee Year of Hope, we are reminded that God's love is mercy in action.

Pope Francis recently reflected on this idea, visibly present in Rembrandt's famous painting "The Return of the Prodigal Son." He said that it shares a central message of the Gospel: "God's love is like that of a father who goes out in search of his lost children."

"The Gospel is intended to give us a message of hope," Pope Francis said, "because it tells us that wherever we are lost, and however we are lost, God always comes looking for us!" In Rembrandt's painting, the

younger son returns home with a shaved head—a sign of repentance, but also rebirth. "This son is being born again," the Holy Father notes.

> That's what happens when mercy meets the messiness of our lives. God doesn't wait for us to be perfect—He runs to us

while we're still far off. Saint John Paul II once said, "Mercy is love's second name." That's what

we celebrate on Divine Mercy Sunday: the Father's heart poured out in love, not just for the holy, but especially for the broken. As Jesus told St. Faustina: "Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet."

The Lord desires everyone to encounter that kind of mercy. That's why this weekend is not just an invitation for you to come homebut maybe to help someone else come home, too. We all know someone who's been away from the Church or afraid to return. You might be the one who walks with them, just as I once walked with Bob.

Pope Francis invites us to look at the parable and ask ourselves: "Where am I in the story?" Am I the younger son, returning in shame? Am I the older son, bitter and distant? Or am I someone being called to reflect the mercy of the Father?"

Wherever we are, the invitation is the same: come home. Come receive the mercy that doesn't just forgive but makes us new.



## **EL SEGUNDO NOMBRE DEL AMOR**

Lo que experimentó ese día fue misericordia. Y la misericordia lo cambia todo.

Al acercarnos al Domingo de la Divina Misericordia (26–27 de abril) durante este Año Jubilar de la Esperanza, se nos recuerda que el amor de Dios es la misericordia en acción.

Recientemente el Papa Francisco reflexionó sobre esta idea, y está visiblemente presente en la famosa pintura de Rembrandt El regreso del hijo pródigo, donde se transmite un mensaje central del Evangelio: "El amor de Dios es como el de un padre que sale en busca de sus hijos perdidos".

"El Evangelio nos da un mensaje de esperanza", dijo el Papa Francisco, "porque nos dice que, estemos donde estemos perdidos, y por la razón que sea, ¡Dios siempre viene a buscarnos!"

En la pintura de Rembrandt, el hijo menor regresa a casa con la cabeza rapada—una señal de arrepentimiento, pero también de

renacimiento. "Este hijo está naciendo de nuevo", señala el Santo Padre. Esto es lo que sucede cuando la misericordia se encuentra con el desorden de nuestra vida. Dios no espera a que seamos perfectos—Él corre hacia nosotros cuando aún estamos lejos.

San Juan Pablo II dijo una vez: "La misericordia es el segundo nombre del amor". Eso es lo que celebramos en el Domingo de la Divina Misericordia: el corazón del Padre derramado en amor, no solo por los santos, sino especialmente por los quebrantados. Como Jesús le dijo a Santa Faustina: "Que ningún alma tema acercarse a Mí, aunque sus pecados sean como la escarlata" (Diario, 699).

El Señor desea que todos experimenten ese tipo de misericordia. Por eso, este fin de semana no solo es una invitación para que tú regreses a casa, sino tal vez puedas ayudar a alguien más a hacerlo también. Todos conocemos a alguien que ha estado alejado de la Iglesia o tiene miedo de volver. Puede que seas tú quien camine con esa persona, como yo una vez caminé con Bob.

El Papa Francisco nos invita a tomar un lugar en la parábola y preguntarnos: ¿Dónde estoy yo en esta historia?" ¿Soy el hijo menor, que regresa con vergüenza? ¿Soy el hijo mayor, amargado y distante? ¿O soy alguien llamado a reflexionar sobre la misericordia del Padre?

Donde quiera que estemos, la invitación es la misma: regresa a casa. Ven a recibir la misericordia que no solo perdona—sino que nos hace nuevos.

## KANSAS CITY BISHOP NAMED

Pope Francis has appointed Bishop Shawn McKnight as the new Archbishop of Kansas City in Kansas, succeeding Archbishop Joseph Naumann, who is retiring after serving the KCK Diocese for over 20 years.

McKnight, currently the Bishop of Jefferson City, Missouri, will be installed on May 27, 2025. Originally from Wichita, he expressed gratitude for his new appointment and said he looks forward to serving the people of the KCK Archdiocese.

# Diocese to see record-number ordinations

Ten men are on track to be ordained to religious vocations in the Diocese of Salina over the next three months.

Three will be ordained priests, while seven will be ordained deacons on two separate days. All three ceremonies will take place at the Sacred Heart Cathedral in Salina.

This is the first time in more than 10 years that the Salina Diocese will celebrate that many ordinations in the same year. It was 2013 when 10 permanent deacons were ordained.

"People have been praying for more vocations to Holy Orders and religious life for a lot of years," said Fr. Andy Hammeke, co-director of vocations for the diocese. "Praise God those prayers are being answered."

This year's trifecta celebration will begin on Saturday, April 26, with the diaconate ordination of

Luke Friess from Sacred Heart Parish in Hoxie. This ordination is one of the last major steps to priesthood.

On May 31, three current transitional deacons - Kade Megaffin, Jesse Ochs and Adam Urban - will be ordained to the priesthood. Dcn. Kade's home parish is St. Joseph, Hays; Dcn. Jesse is from Sacred Heart, Park; and Dcn. Adam, St. Nicholas of Myra, Hays.

Then, on June 28, six men will complete their five-year diaconate discernment and formation program when they are ordained as permanent deacons.

That list is comprised of Dave DiNuzzo, St. John the Baptist-Beloit; Tim Donohoue, Seven Dolors of the Blessed Virgin Mary-Manhattan; Harry Hardy, St. Thomas More-Manhattan; Mark LeValley, St. Mary Queen of the Universe-Salina; Bill Meagher, St. Nicholas of Myra-Hays; and Dan Wahlmeier, St. Joseph-New Almelo.

While responsibilities are virtually the same for transitional and permanent deacons, they are referred to as such to distinguish between those transitioning to the priesthood and those who will remain deacons for life.

All deacons assist at the altar during Mass, proclaim the

Gospel and perform other liturgical functions, including baptisms.

"I'm so excited about all our deacons and our three new priests," Father Andy said. "We hope these ordinations will inspire others to be called to the diaconate and priesthood."



# Diocese unites for Holy Hour of Reparation

On March 28, incense and the sound of prayer filled Salina's Sacred Heart Cathedral, where Bishop Vincke led almost 200 members of the diocese in a rosary, followed by a prayer of consecration to Jesus through Mary. The prayer served as a response to a sacrilegious event occurring in Topeka at the same

The sacrilegious event, organized by a Satanic group, sparked significant unrest within Christian communities in Kansas. In early March, the group had announced plans to desecrate

Christian items, including a Bible and a cross, during the event at the state capitol in Topeka.

The Satanic group also claimed it had the Eucharist and intended to defile it during the ceremony. However, the group later testified in court that it did

not possess actual consecrated hosts or wine but had instead purchased substitutes online.

The Bishops of Kansas called upon the faithful to pray for the conversion of those involved in the Satanic event. Archbishop

Joseph Naumann of Kansas City led a Holy Hour and Mass of Reparation across the street from the capitol.

Closer to home, Bishop Gerald Vincke of Salina organized a

Holy Hour of **ESUS IS WITH US** Reparation WE DO NOT NEED and Mass at Sacred Heart TO BE AFRAID.' Cathedral in **-BISHOP GERALD VINCKE** Salina.

> During the Mass, the congregation heard a first reading from Hosea, fittingly about conversion, as it read, "Return, O Israel, to the LORD,

Bishop Vincke echoed this call

to conversion during his homily. He encouraged the faithful to love God and their neighbors, especially the people involved in the Satanic group.

"Love them, and pray for them. That is what we're called to do."

He reassured the congregation, particularly those unsettled by the events.

"Jesus is with us, we do not need to be afraid," he said. "Pray to cling to Jesus. Satan is real, but he has no power over Jesus."

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# **Encounters in Ukraine** Bishop visits the suffering people

## Why did I go to Ukraine?

I am the chair for the Subcommittee on Aid for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe for the Bishops of the United States. My group traveled to Ukraine with a twofold purpose: first, to show solidarity with the people of Ukraine, to be with those who are enduring unimaginable hardship due to the ongoing war with Russia, and second, to witness firsthand the projects in Ukraine which the Church here in the U.S. financially supports.

#### **Encounters**

One of the most moving parts of the trip was our visit to a refugee shelter, where families displaced by the war were being housed. We financially support small living modules, each only 12 by

16 feet in size. The simplicity of these shelters, yet the deep need for them, struck me. It was heart-wrenching to see so many families forced from their homes with so little. We also support a small shelter that provides food and meals for these internally displaced people.

An elderly woman thanked me for coming to Ukraine to be with the people. She said "It's one thing to hear that you care, but it is another for me to be able to touch you and you touch me."

In addition to these encounters, we traveled to Lviv and visited a Catholic communication studio, which serves three million regular listeners.

While there, I also met with His Beatitude Sviatoslav Shevchuk, the Father and Head of the Ukrainian

Greek Catholic Church. His stories were powerful.

Shevchuk shared that "charity during wartime is about saving lives, restoring hope, and the ability to perform deeds that, according to Christian tradition, are acts created in eternity."

#### A message of hope

I have to admit, the trip was tense. The people of Ukraine are tired. They go on with life, but there is always the threat of danger. Many people there told me, "We believe in God, so we have hope." This experience has certainly put life into perspective for me. All the things that I worry about seem minimal compared to what the people of Ukraine are experiencing. During this trip, I witnessed both the devastation of war and the unyielding spirit of the



Bishop Vincke said a most heartbreaking moment from the trip was meeting a young woman who had been attending Liturgy every day for 16 months, praying that her fiancé would soon return home after being captured.

Ukrainian people. I hope the war ends soon. The people need healing now, and will need a lot of healing afterwards.

I met a man in his seventies who had spent eight years in a Siberian Gulag, enduring forced labor and freezing temperatures. When we spoke about the war and Russia's aggression, he paused and said, "What gives me hope, though, is

that in the end, evil does not win." His words stayed with me, a powerful reminder that, no matter the darkness, there is always hope that good will ultimately triumph.

# Pilgrimage leads faithful to Sacred Sites

On March 25, the Feast of the Annunciation, pilgrims gathered at Sacred Heart Cathedral in Salina to begin a one-day pilgrimage across the Diocese of Salina. The day started with Mass, celebrated by Bishop Gerald Vincke, who sent the group off with a blessing.

"May Mary cover you with her mantle, and may you encounter Christ close to your heart on this feast of the Annunciation," Bishop Vincke said.

The pilgrims then visited four churches across the diocese: St. Isidore's in Manhattan, St. John the Baptist in Beloit, Immaculate Heart of Mary in Hays and St. Fidelis Basilica in Victoria. Although St. Fidelis is not one of the designated Sacred Sites for the diocese during the Jubilee Year of Hope, it remains a significant destination as a minor basilica and the home of the Capuchin Friars.

Additional Sacred Sites recognized for the Year of Hope include Catholic Charities of Northwest Kansas and St. Paul Church in Angelus. As part of the Jubilee year's

celebrations, the faithful can receive a plenary indulgence by making a prayerful visit to any designated Sacred Site, taking time to pray for the pope's intentions, and fulfilling the usual conditions of confession, Communion, and detachment from sin.

Karen Jurgensmeier of Salina joined the pilgrims alongside her sister-inlaw, eager to experience churches she had never visited before.

"I have vision difficulties and can't drive outside of Salina," Jurgensmeier said. "When this pilgrimage came up, I thought, 'I would really like to do that.' It was a great opportunity to go be with other people who are of the same mind, and just visit churches that you don't normally get to see."


She added, "I think we were all there for the same purpose—to see beautiful churches and give glory to God."

The event was coordinated by Carolyn Berens and Diocese Ministry Leader Jamie Kuhlman, who said the journey, while long, was spiritually enriching.

"It was a long day, but a fruitful one," Kuhlman said. "I got to see so many people draw closer to God when we looked at all the churches and just the beauty of that, and seeing them pray together and make new friends. That's really what we were out

there for."

She also shared her excitement for two upcoming pilgrimages planned by the diocese: a two-day journey to the tomb of Blessed Emil Kapaun and the Blessed Stanley Rother Shrine, and a week-long trip to several major shrines as far as Chicago and Wisconsin.

# Hands-on class allows St. John's students real-world experience with EWTN

Students at St. John's Catholic School in Beloit are gaining invaluable real-world experience thanks to a unique media class that combines faith, technology, and hands-on learning.

The class is taught by Alan Holdren, former EWTN Vatican Bureau Chief in Rome, who lives in Beloit and still reports for the Catholic network on occasion. His class equips students with skills related to video production, editing, and morewhich they are using to share stories with both their community and the world.

Earlier this semester, the class partnered up with an EWTN program called Pro Life Weekly to report on the Kansas March for Life. The students' coverage can be found on EWTN's You-Tube channel, which has 1.11 million subscribers.

That partnership has since gained them even more attention from the network. This has led to them being asked to produce a video on confir-

mation and Carlo Acutis. It will air on EWTN during its coverage of the Jubilee of Teenagers, which takes place April 25-27 and culminates in the canonization of Carlo Acutis, a patron for youth and technology.

"It's young people creating content about other young people," Holdren said. "And in this case, it's young people the same age as Carlo Acutis was, doing this coverage. That's special."

The students and Holdren have been hard at work over the last month, interviewing Bishop Gerald Vincke at the start of April, and then taking a trip to Salina April 7 to work on their upcoming projects.

While in Salina, they met with Superintendent of Catholic Schools, Geoff Andrews, and they joined the students of Sacred Heart for morning Mass.

Holdren said he was grateful for the experience, calling it a "way for our kids to see the reality at other Catholic schools."

After interviewing some students at Sacred Heart, the group headed over to the Chancery and met with Youth Ministry Director, Bill Meagher, and with HR Director, Kim Hoelting.

The students interviewed Meagher about confirmation, and how young people can grow in holiness. They also discussed the potential of creating a video to play at the upcoming Eucharistic Conference in August.

Alongside excitement about their local and national coverage, the students are equally excited about how the class has allowed them hands-on access to video cameras and editing software to use for projects in their school.

"I love it," student Christiana Niewald said with a smile. "The editing is a lot of fun, just putting videos together and all the pieces that go into it."

Niewald, along with her classmates, said she is looking forward to their future projects.

Inspired by Carlo Acutis' example, may they continue to use technoloy to spread the faith and connect with the world.

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# Love N' Learn celebrates ribbon cutting

Love N' Learn Early Childhood Center (LNL) on the Salina Catholic Schools campus held a ceremonial ribbon-cutting on March 25 to celebrate the completion of a major building renovation that expanded learning space. Nearby Catholic school students, many of whom attended LNL when they were younger, joined parents, service providers, and community members on the new playground turf to mark the occasion.

Geoff Andrews, Superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Salina Diocese, called the celebration a "milestone moment, not only for our Catholic schools, but for the entire Salina community."

The childhood center serves infants 8 weeks old through pre-K. Through the renovation, LNL has three infant classrooms, three toddler classrooms and six pre-school classrooms, with capacity to serve up to 173 children, though enrollment will likely be lower than that.

Many people and organizations have made the renovation possible, including educators, support staff, the Salina Chamber of Commerce and Salina Area United Way, which generously assisted LNL through its Early

Childcare Initiative Fund.

Christina Small, executive director at United Way, spoke at the ribbon-cutting ceremony. She shared that grant funding from Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund — of \$1.87 million at first, followed by an additional \$316,000 — has had a great impact on childcare in the Salina community over the last few years. These funds helped launch and expand several centers in

Saline County, including LNL.

"These grants have not only expanded access to child care, but have also improved the quality of care and education that our children receive," Small said. "And when we invest in our children, we invest in our future."

Parent Hillary Richards is a mother of three young children and said the services at LNL have been a blessing for her family.

"When we were looking for childcare in preschool, we wanted a place that felt like an extension of our home, where faith, learning and love were at the heart of everything, and we know we found that here," Richards said.



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# Hundreds gather, 'Becoming Light Together'

Hundreds of young people have been impacted for life because of their experience at the Comeau Catholic Campus Center (CCCC) at Fort Hays State University in Hays.

That was never more evident than during the Mass for the Fourth Annual Becoming Light Together fundraiser for the CCCC in mid April.

Bishop Gerald Vincke was accompanied at the altar by four FHSU graduates: Father Andy Hammeke, current chaplain at the center; Deacons Kade Megaffin and Adam Urban, who will be ordained priests in May; and Seminarian Max Megaffin.

"The campus center taught me how to live in a community of faith," Dcn. Adam said. "Really, for me, it's everything. I owe so much to the campus center and the students and peers on my journey to the priesthood."

The St. Francis of Assisi chapel at the CCCC

was overflowing at the Mass that was followed by a dinner and program.

The event, begun in 2022, has grown exponentially every year, with the nearly 250 registrations this year surpassing last year's number by almost 100.

The fundraiser is a way of helping support the Catholic Tigers organization.

More than 450 students actively participate in Catholic Tigers through various events such as Mass, bible studies, retreats, mission trips and daily prayer – to name a few. Fifteen more FHSU students joined the Catholic Church on Easter weekend.

During the program, Fr. Andy, in his fourth year as the CCCC chaplain, thanked many people and organizations for their support.

He gave credit to Fr. Fred Gatschet for his work as the CCCC chaplain for 20 years until 2019. Fr. Brian Lager took over as chaplain that year and hired a full-time development director for the center.

Dcn. Adam, who grew up in Hays as a parishioner of St. Nicholas of Myra Church, was one of the program speakers.

He likened the CCCC to the shore when the disciples met Jesus near the Sea of Galilee.

"The campus center is a place where students can drop their net and not be afraid to be the light the Lord wants us to be," Dcn. Adam said, reiterating how influential his time with Catholic Tigers was to his faith life.

Echoing those sentiments was FHSU freshman Kynlee Flavin, who had no intentions of attending FHSU, from where both her parents – Tyler and Heather Flavin – graduated.

Following her graduation from Meade High School in 2024, she was all set to pack her bags en route to the University of St. Mary in Bismarck, North Dakota.

But that all changed when Flavin, an elementary education major, visited FHSU one weekend late last summer and attended Mass at the Comeau center.

"I knew right away this is where I wanted to be," Flavin said, indicating that Catholics are a minority in Meade and how she immediately felt at home at the CCCC.

"The center brings students to a community where we can grow in our faith and where faith is accepted and supported," she said.

Anne Wheaton, current director of development for the CCCC, is also an FHSU alum.

"I truly would not be here without the Comeau Catholic Campus Center," she said. "From early on in my college career, there was a peace in that chapel that I couldn't find anywhere else on campus."

Numerous businesses and individuals help sponsor the Becoming Light Together event, with the Leo J. Dreiling and Albina Dreiling Charitable Trust providing matching funds for the first \$50,000 raised.

# FHSU campus center fills 2 key positions

The patron saint of the Comeau Catholic Campus Center at Fort Hays State University is St. Francis of Assisi.

With the growth of the student population involved at the center, the CCCC has added the position of campus minister.

Lucas Roths will join Jana Fross, another new hire, in helping the center's chaplain, Fr. Andy Hammeke, in ministering to FHSU students.

Fross will take over as development director at the CCCC after Anne Wheaton, who currently fills that position, announced she was accepting a position with the Catholic outreach program FOCUS (Fellowship of Catholic University Students).

As the CCCC's director of campus ministry, he will be responsible for expanding the student ministry and will be in charge of eight students who hold leadership roles at the center.

"Lucas was very involved during his time here, was a key member of the campus center and has remained close with our alumni," Fr. Andy said. "We interviewed a lot of good candidates, and Lucas stood out."

Fross has a wealth of experience with a 26-year career in development. Following

her stint at the FHSU Foundation, she has served as senior development coordinator the past 18 years at the Hays Medical Center Foundation.

A lifelong member of Immaculate Heart of Mary parish in Hays, Fross has been involved in multiple ministries in her parish and the diocese but primarily focused her time as a

catechist.

"This position was in a sense my two worlds colliding, and I was intrigued right away," Fross said. "This involves everything I love about my faith and streamlines into my job skill set. It all feels so natural."

Fr. Andy agreed.

"It's a good combination of having been involved in development for a lot of Jana's career and a faithful woman who loves the Church," he said. "With her pastoral faith and experience, we couldn't have gotten a better person for that job."

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# Diocese remembers Fr. Bill Surmeier

Father William J. Surmeier was born in Hays, Kansas on January 7, 1940, the second son of Anton and Gertrude (Fellhoelter) Surmeier and passed away on April 3, 2025.

He attended St. Paul's Catholic School in Angelus, Thomas County Grade School in Oakley and St. Francis High School Seminary in Victoria. He attended college and theology at Conception Seminary, Conception, Missouri, and was ordained a priest for the Salina Diocese on May 27, 1965, in his home parish in Oakley.

Fr. Bill took a year-long sabbatical and earned a Master's degree in Pastoral Counseling at Loyola University, Columbia, Maryland. He earned his Doctorate in Psychology from the Graduate Theological Foundation in Indiana.

He served as an associate pastor in the Sacred Heart Cathedral Parish, Salina, from '65-'67, St. Xavier's Parish, Junction City, '67-'69, Immaculate Heart of Mary, Hays, '69-'72, Sacred Heart and St. Michael Parishes in Greenleaf/Kimeo, '71, and Team Ministry, '72-'82 at Selden, Oberlin, Logan, Leoville, New Almelo and Densmore. He was pastor of St. Mary Queen of the Universe Parish, Salina, '82-91, St. Nicholas of Myra, Hays, '93-2005, Sacred Heart and St. Thomas, Plainville and Stockton, 2005-'08, and St. Mary Parish, Gorham, 2008-'14.

Fr. Bill served as Priest Council president for many terms during the 1970s and '80s under Bishops Cyril Vogel, Daniel Kucera, and George Fitzsimons. Fr. Bill was known for his dedication to the youth of our diocese. He was CYO Director from 1969 to 1984 under Bishop Vogel, developing a strong youth ministry and the first Youth Council for our diocese.

One of Fr. Bill's passions was empowering Lay Ministry in our diocese, and with the aid of the Parish Pastoral Council at St. Nick's, he was the first to hire a Pastoral Administrator, Arvilla Jueneman, for St. Nicholas of Myra Parish.

His vocation also led him to full-time counseling for Catholic Charities in Hays from 1993 to 2014 until he retired.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Tony and Gertrude, two sisters, Clara Zimmerman and Theresa Surmeier, and one brother, Alvin Surmeier.

Fr. Bill was our first diocesan Director of Youth Ministry and held that position from 1969-1984. He did so much for the young people of our diocese and personally impacted many people throughout his life. His impact was so significant that when Sr. Barb took over the office in 1984, she named the unit of the year award in his honor as a way to mark the impact he had on youth ministry.

Personally, I can't tell you how much Fr. Bill meant to me. He not only married Mandy and me but also both

of our parents. My first memories of him are from when I was very young, and I would go with my dad to St. Mary's, Salina, when he practiced the organ. Fr. Bill would rescue me from my boredom and take me over to find some cookies and hang out with him and the other priest and staff.

He always said that I was named after him, and to be honest, I always hoped that he was part of my parents' decision to name me William/Bill.

Throughout the years, he was always there to answer my questions and mentor me through life. He was an incredible priest, youth minister, and man of God. He will be missed.
