What do we Seek?

On the weekend of January 4, we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. The word Epiphany means 'manifestation.' Together, with the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan river and the wedding feast of Cana, the great feast of Epiphany is the manifestation of Jesus to the world as the king of all nations.

In the Scriptures, we read that the magi, in search for the newborn king, were guided by a star. They asked King Herod of Jerusalem, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." They were led six miles further to go to Bethlehem.

I have always wondered about the star. Why didn't the people in Jerusalem notice the star? Were they too busy to notice? Were their hearts focused on

other things that seemed important but really aren't? Josef Pieper, a wonderful Catholic philosopher, made an interesting statement, "Man's ability to see is in decline because he sees too much." Pieper seems to be saying that our eyes see so much that we often don't see what's really important—the person in front of us, the poor who need our help, the beautiful creation that God has given us, and even the desire to seek Jesus. Pieper added, "The greatest menace to our capacity for contemplation is the incessant fabrication of tawdry empty stimuli which kill the receptivity of the soul."

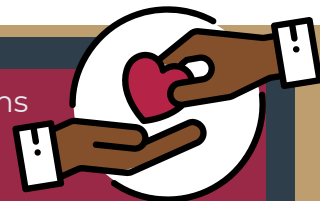
Scripture tells us that the magi "were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage."

THE EPIPHANY

This year, the Catholic Church will celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord on January 4th

The Epiphany is a **Solemnity**, which is the highest celebration in the church! This means that Epiphany is more important than other things, like Feast Days and Memorials.

During Mass on a Solemnity, we pray the Gloria and the Creed.

Epiphany means “manifestation”, it is when we celebrate God “manifesting” Himself (or, “becoming present”) in our world!

He manifests Himself through the arrival of the three Magi, and we also celebrate Jesus’ baptism and first miracle on Epiphany too.
